#### Killed on the Railway.

The latest news of the mutilated remains of the unfortunate young man killed in the railway yards by the incoming Rio Grande train developed no new facts. The jury, consisting of Thomas W. Jones, A. G. Harris and Joe Clayton, who, together with Coroner Allen, made a searching examination of all the circumstances known to the case, they were, however, unable to place any blame upon the railway company or any of its employees. A verdict, therefore, was rendered to the effect that the deceased came to his death by being run over by a Rio Grande Western train, and that the matter was purely accidental.

It was thought by a number of people who saw the remains that the unfortunate man was one of the convicts who lately escaped from the penitentiary. Marshal Brigham and Mr. Hunt, one of the guards, came up from Salt Lake and viewed the body, but as they decided that the remains of a convict there did not represent any of their recent jail birds.

#### Board of Education.

The board of education met last night and heard the reports of the census enumerators, who have now completed their labors. The reports show a total of 2042 children of school age in the city of Ogden, divided among the several wards as follows: First ward 522, Second ward 422, Third ward 722, Fourth ward 322, Fifth ward 100. The improvement contemplated being made in the sanitary condition of the central school building was not acted upon last night, but will probably come up next Friday night.

#### Guilt of Assault.

In yesterday's session of the police court the Luma Garrison assault and battery case, which had been pending for a number of days, was heard by Justice Callahan. Garrison was found guilty of the charge of assault against Mrs. Jay Crandall, and was fined \$10 and costs \$2.50, a total of \$12.50, which, however, was remitted by Mayor Lundy.

#### Canning Company Receivership.

H. W. Nelson took charge yesterday of the entire property of the Utah Canning Company in this Territory, as receiver, he having been appointed as such by Justice Minto on the petition of Edgar Jones, one of the largest stockholders of the concern. The business was closed within five days, since by Deputy Marshal Evans notice was attached and issued at the Fourth district court on the claim of Thomas O. Adams, who holds certain promissory notes at the company. Later the directors met and decided to make

THE INSANE ASYLUM.  
Contractors Will Wait for Their Cash - \$15,000 Loan.

The regular session of the Territorial Insane Asylum board was held yesterday. The following business was transacted:

The sum of \$500 was appropriated to Henry Standen for the construction of five escape ladders. The executive committee was instructed to have the ladders and the stand pipe extended to the deck of the roof of the administration building.

The executive committee reported that the contractors for furnishing supplies were willing to carry the account until funds could be obtained, with the understanding that a reasonable per cent be added to their bills. Report accepted.

It was recommended by the executive committee that certain changes and repairs be made in the air duct and heating apparatus in order to economize fuel. Referred to the executive committee with authority to act.

Judge Sheriff introduced the following resolution:

Whereas, this institution is without funds to meet its current expenses and no funds can be gotten from the Territorial treasury;

Resolved, That the treasurer of the asylum is authorized to borrow not exceeding \$1500, and not to exceed 10 per cent interest per annum, and to deposit any Territorial warrants in his possession to secure payment of same.

#### Notes.

A. H. Child has sworn out a complaint in Justice Callahan's court, charging George Welch with shooting him twice and firing on the night the Child granary was destroyed by fire. The case will be heard today.

The suit of the Central Building Co. vs. H. V. Academy directing, to recover \$20,000, which was referred to the Territorial News, one year died with the death of the First district court. Byron Tanner, one of the directors of the academy, makes the statement that there is no liability for the suit, as the Central Building Co. never tendered any money in payment for the ground, but the money was loaned during the construction of the building for a short while, and was repaid.

Several young ladies and gentlemen of this city went to Springfield last night as a social party.

The body of William Darden, who killed himself with a shotgun near Rock Hill's ranch on Wednesday, was brought to Provo on Thursday evening and buried the same night.

A meeting of the employees of the Provo Woolen mill, who have been called by Secretary Bassett for this afternoon, the manufacture of the California mill will come up for consideration.

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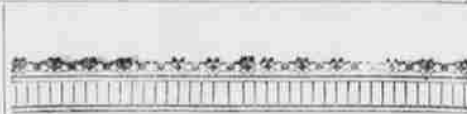
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
