White Plains, N. Y., July 27 .- Harry K. Thaw sat in the supreme court here today and heard a woman's testimony that made his pallid face flush. One of them who, she said, passed as Thaw's wife, received \$7,000. The money came from Thaw. The mysterious package brought to court yesterday by Clifford W. Hart-ridge, Thaw's former counsel, was un-wrapped and a pearl-handled whip about three free long was brought into view. With this before the eyes of the court and spectators the woman related a series of stories about finding Thaw on several occasions lashing the girls upon their bare arms and bodies. Thay, she said, had posed as a theat-rical agent and had lured the girls to his rooms with promises of engage-ments. Morrill's testimony was stopped when Mr. Jerome intimated that it might injure innocent persons. Under cross-examination by Charles Mor-schauser, counsel for Thaw, the wit-ness was attacked fiercely. He brought out the fact that she had been re-cently arrested on a charge of perjury, after an unsuccessful suit to recover \$100,000 damages from a man. The woman emphatically denied that she kept any of the money that passed from Thaw through her hands. "Then why did you stand for all this from Thav?" asked Mr. Morschauser. "Oh, I felt sorry for him." was her answer. irrational

answer. Evelyn Nesbit Thaw appeared during the proceedings today, but did not tes-tify. She smiled at Thaw several times, but he paid no attention to her. Aside from Mrs. Merril's testimony, the alienists took up the remainder of the proceedings and testified in Thaw's bobal! behalf.

Dr. Britton D. Evans, who made a report two years ago declaring Thaw insane, said today that he had reversed this opinion. He admitted the report was prepared to bolster Thaw's side of the case when he was seeking to avoid the electric chair.
