

THAW'S PALLID FACE FLUSHED

As He Heard Mrs. Susan Merrill
Tell How She Saw Him
Whip Girls.

HE USED A FANCY DOG WHIP

She Kept a Boarding House and He
Rented a Room Under an
Assumed Name.

White Plains, N. Y., July 27.—Harry K. Thaw sat in the supreme court here today and heard a woman's testimony that made his pallid face flush. He saw a pearl-handled dog whip exhibited and he heard the witness swear she had seen him wield it on the bare flesh of girls. The prisoner's wife heard most of the testimony, which was of such a nature that Justice Mills preceded its presentation with the warning that "No woman should

stay in the court room unless she is willing to hear everything." Two girls left.

The witness was Mrs. Susan Merrill, a buxom woman of about 35 years, and she opened a new chapter in the life of Stanford White's slayer. She told of alleged acts of his between 1902 and 1905, when he was a bachelor about New York, before the tragedy on the Madison Square roof garden that resulted in his being placed in the state asylum for the criminal insane, from which he is now trying to escape by proving himself sane.

Her testimony was in marked contrast to that of two alienists, who gave Thaw a clean bill of health, declaring that in their opinion he was sane. She testified that during the three years named she kept in succession two New York lodging houses, where Thaw rented rooms under an assumed name, and to which he brought at various times more than 200 girls. After Thaw's imprisonment, she said, she paid these women at least \$25,000 as the price of their silence and to "keep them from bothering Thaw's wife or his mother." One of them, who she said, passed as Thaw's wife, received \$7,000. The money came from Thaw.

The mysterious package brought to court yesterday by Clifford W. Hart, Thaw's former counsel, was unwrapped and a pearl-handled whip about three feet long was brought into view. With this before the eyes of the court and spectators the woman related a series of stories about finding Thaw on several occasions lashing the girls upon their bare arms and bodies. Thaw, she said, had posed as a theatrical agent and had lured the girls to his rooms with promises of engagements. When she manifested with him, she testified, his excuse was that the girls "were not smart enough and could not fill their positions and de-

served a beating." She testified further that Thaw had frequently behaved violently and that she considered his acts irrational.

Mrs. Merrill's testimony was stopped when Mr. Jerome intimidated that it might injure innocent persons. Under cross-examination by Charles Moerschauer, counsel for Thaw, the witness was attacked fiercely. He brought out the fact that she had been recently arrested on a charge of perjury, after an unsuccessful suit to recover \$100,000 damages from a man. The woman emphatically denied that she kept any of the money that passed from Thaw through her hands.

"Why did you stand off all this from Thaw?" asked Mr. Moerschauer. "Oh, I felt sorry for him," was her answer.

Evelyn Nesbit Thaw appeared during the proceedings today, but did not testify. She smiled at Thaw several times, but he paid no attention to her. Aside from Mrs. Merrill's testimony, the alienists took up the remainder of the proceedings and testified in Thaw's behalf.

Dr. Britton D. Evans, who made a report two years ago declaring Thaw insane, said today that he had reversed this opinion. He admitted the report was prepared to bolster Thaw's side of the case when he was seeking to avoid the electric chair.

LEAP FROG PLAYER LEAPED TOO FAR

New York, July 28.—The fact that James Graham, 12 years old, was one of the best leapfrog players among his companions, is a contributing cause to his presence in St. Vincent's hospital, where he is dying with a fractured skull, seven broken ribs and internal injuries. James was playing leapfrog on the roof of a seven-story tenement on West Tenth street when he made such a long leap over the bended back of another boy that instead of landing on the air-shaft seven stories to the bottom, in that neighborhood there are no playgrounds, and most of the children play either on the streets or on the roofs.

CLAIMED A PARDON, SENT BACK TO PRISON

Jackson, Miss., July 28.—George Upshur, "absent" without leave from a state prison, where he was sentenced for conducting a "blind tiger," walked in on Gov. Noel yesterday to present his claims for a pardon. As a result Upshur not only did not receive the desired pardon, but was restrained in the office until the arrival of prison officials. He resumed serving his sentence today.

GERMAN SPORTSMAN TO HUNT IN ALASKA

New York, July 28.—Heinrich von Brockhausen, a well known German sportsman, has arrived here and will immediately start for Alaska. He is to join a number of Englishmen who will comprise a big game hunting expedition into Alaska. Von Brockhausen bears on his cheek a long red scar, the souvenir of his thrilling encounter with a bear in the woods of last year. The animal was springing for him at a distance of 20 feet when the hunter's bullet crashed through his skull. Although having fatally wounded the animal, the hunter could not dodge the spring and his face was laid open by one of the animal's paws.

HAD MONEY TO BURN, UNINTENTIONALLY BURNED IT

Kewanee, Ill., July 28.—When Mrs. James Williams, left her home to go to the timber for an outing, she placed the family strong-box containing cash and notes to the value of \$100 in the cook-stove oven. She was late reaching home and started a quick fire in the stove to get supper, forgetting the money. When the odor of burning paper was discovered, she opened the oven to find the box fallen to pieces and the paper money destroyed. Only ashes remaining of all the bills except one of \$20 denomination. Some papers were legible, although badly scorched.

UNUSUAL PUNISHMENT.

Girls in Shirt Waist Factory Forbidden to Talk, Strike.

New York, July 28.—Two hundred girls employed in a shirt-waist factory in East Tenth street have gone on strike because the management posted a notice prohibiting conversation during lunch hour. It has been the custom of the girls to bring their lunches in the workroom, and during that hour to talk and enjoy themselves. Rather than be denied the privilege they decided to go on strike and now propose to negotiate with the company for more wages and less work together with the privilege of talking as much as they please while eating.

BONES OF ANIMALS FOUND IN ASPHALT BEDS

Los Angeles, Cal., July 27.—The academy of science today asked the city council for \$500 to be used in developing a remarkable deposit of bones of antediluvian animals in the asphalt beds near Hollywood.

Work is now being carried on there by the University of California, the

University of Southern California, the Los Angeles high school and the Los Angeles academy of science, each institution having an allotment of land 50 feet square in which the bones lie covers about five acres.

There have been exhumed so far complete skeletons of a giant sloth, an animal almost as big as a street car, and several sabre-toothed tigers; a prehistoric lion of the African type, but larger; a giant camel; three species of prehistoric wolves; a horse that seems to have been larger than any that exist today; giant eagles and condors; a large number of miscellaneous rodents; a small prehistoric cat; the skull of a bird larger than an ostrich, and portions of elephants' skeletons.

The greatest find was the skull of an extinct species of buffalo or prehistoric ox. So far as known, there is not another like it in the world, and it is said to be worth \$1,000. The types of animals shown by these discoveries seem to have been common here several thousand years ago.

FRENCH SOCIALISTS PROTEST AGAINST CZAR'S VISIT

Paris, July 27.—The Socialist workmen's organizations today issued a violently worded manifesto against the visit of the Russian emperor to Cherbourg, which it says was cowardly planned to occur at sea. Nevertheless, a summons has been sent to the proletariat everywhere, the manifesto says, to meet July 31 and register the protest against the emperor's appearance "off a country which is proud of the decapitation of Louis XVI."

CZAR MAKING VISIT TO GERMANY

Eskernroede, Schleswig-Holstein, July 27.—The Russian imperial yacht Standard, with Emperor Nicholas, Empress Alexandra and their children on board, and a naval escort, anchored in this harbor at sea. The emperor and empress landed and went to Prince Henry's country place at Hemmesmark.

Extraordinary precautions have been taken to guard the Russian sovereigns from attack. German torpedo boats are picketed around the Russian squadron to prevent the approach of any unauthorized craft.

London, July 27.—The government has granted a pension of \$2,500 annually to Lady Wylie, widow of Lieut. Col. Sir William H. C. Wylie, who was assassinated recently by Madaral Dhinagari, an Indian student.

MONUMENTAL HATS FOR FASHIONABLE WOMEN

New York, July 28.—A consignment of 200 of the monumental hats for women, which it is predicted will displace the wide spreading peach-baskets, arrived here yesterday from Paris. The hats are made of fur, and suggest the beak of the old guard.

They are called Russian toques. The toque does away with hats and the spreading collar. On the other hand, it is a skyscraper. The loftiest may be slightly over four feet from the foundation, at the forehead, to the apex, which is crowned with an albatross. The woman who wears her hat must comb her hair upward and secure it in a ball on top of her head.

LAW SUIT ENDS IN TRAGEDY IN COURTROOM

Little Rock, Ark., July 27.—Shooting over the head of United States Senator Jeff Davis, W. C. Ellis, a resident of Pine Bluff, instantly killed Nathaniel P. Willis of Indianapolis, in the circuit court room here today.

The shooting was the tragic ending of a lawsuit brought by Willis against his divorced wife, who had subsequently married Ellis. The suit was for the possession of Willis' child.

Willis had secured an order to take possession of the child and today the parties to the suit met in the courtroom to decide where the child was to be delivered. Ellis appeared for his wife, and Senator Davis represented Willis. Ellis suddenly drew a revolver and fired at Willis, who was seated at a table.
