EVENTS OF THE FOURTH.

Grand Celebration Followed by Usual Sports—Horseshoeing Events.

Logan, Cache Co., July 4.—Logan celebrated the Fourth in grand style. At midnight the booming began and ended with a cannon salute at sunrise. The program began with a concert by the city band on the tabernacle square. At 10 a. m. there was a meeting at the tabernacle. The opening feature was a chorus and flag drill in which hundreds of small children participated under the leadership of Prof. George F. Thomas.

R. K. Nebeker read the Declaration of Independence. The pastor of the day, Rev. Goshen, was orator of the day. His presentation of the early life of our country was both interesting and instructive. At the close "America" was sung by the great audience. The Logan band rendered a number of patriotic songs during the meeting.

The features of the afternoon were horse races, on the square for the children and baseball and races of the entertainment of the older ones. The ball game was played by the business men of Center street and those of First North and was pretty evenly contested. The final score was 4 to 3 in favor of Center street.

The horse races were a pleasing feature of the day's exercises and attracted a large crowd to the city park. There was no long wait between races and everything passed off smoothly. The first race was a 2 1/2 foot and half; won by Valentine, a Halley, Ida, home; second, second; Raymond, third, time, 2:32.

Three-minute trot and pace; purse \$100; won by Elmer's Frank W. Prince, second; Ruben, third, time, 2:16.

Three-minute dash; purse \$100; won by Andrew's Prince Best; Humphrey's Dick, second; Jessop's Greyhound, third, time, 41 seconds.

Quarter mile dash; purse \$15. Eight horses were entered for this race. Nym's Pearl won and was awarded \$10.

A consolation race for losers in the other races was won by Bar's Pet; purse \$5.

THE BABY SHOW.

The baby show was a great success. A large number of the "mother's pets" were exhibited. Mrs. P. A. Yoder, Mrs. Korn-

pat and B. M. Lewis were the judges. The following awards were made: First prize, Arthur Farmer, Logan; second prize, Samuel Dowdle, College; third prize, W. H. Petty, Logan.

The display of fireworks which were let off from the top of the temple hill in the evening was a very pleasing feature of the day's exercises. The program closed with a grand ball at the pavilion.

Any day passed off quietly without any serious accident occurring to mar the proceedings. During the races a horse dashed into the crowd, but was stopped before any one was particularly hurt. A horse was knocked down and bruised some, but not seriously.

SMALL BLAZE.

INDEPENDENCE DAY.

Best Celebration in Lehi's History—Two Days' Amusements.

Lehi, Utah Co., July 4.—The Fourth just passed has witnessed one of the best celebrations in Lehi's history. It really commenced on the afternoon of the third when the Garland parade arrived, and were met by the Silver band and the greater part of the citizens. Probably 200 people were down from Garland and surrounding towns, many Lehi people who hold important positions with the sugar companies of Colorado, Idaho, Canada and other places, also here for the holidays. On the evening of the 3rd the Garland Dramatic company presented "My Partner" to more than full house in the Opera House. The morning of the Fourth was ushered in with the booming of cannon and the firing of the guns. The large sticking station of the Garland and Lehi bands, string bands, etc. At 10 o'clock the people assembled in the new tabernacle, which was beautifully decorated, when an inspiring program was given. At 1 p. m. there were children's sports in the park and at 2 p. m. the event of the day, a grand ball game between Lehi and Garland, was pulled off, Garland winning by a score of 9 to 3. In the evening there was a grand display of fireworks on the ballgrounds, after which the day's festivities wound up with a ball in the pavilion. Fortunately there were no accidents.

This afternoon another game of ball was in progress between Lehi and Garland, and another grand ball will be played in the pavilion this evening.

FILLMORE.

DISASTROUS BLAZE.

Hay and Corals of O. H. Huntsman Destroyed.

Fillmore City, Millard Co., July 4.—Fillmore was aroused from its quiet noon rest by the cry of fire, and all persons rushed in the direction of the smoke. It appears that by some unknown cause, a loaded wagon standing alongside of O. H. Huntsman's hay-winch caught fire, and in less time than it took to take to relate it, the entire load was a mass of flame, and the stack was immediately enveloped. The heat was so intense and the flames being of such proportions that it could approach near the wagon or stack. The frame stable abutting to the south end of the stack and all adjoining sheds and outhouses were soon a mass of fire. By great efforts of neighbors the structure adjacent to the stable were torn down and removed, and the fire was kept in the material composing the buildings in the corral; when the flames subsided some water was applied to the burning haystack and a small portion of the hay was saved. All the animals and poultry escaped unhurt. The estimated loss is: Hay \$100, wagon \$50, buildings and other material \$750. No insurance.

TORN BODIES FOUND.

Of Two Boys Who Set Off Dynamite On the Fourth.

Deadwood, S. D., July 4.—The torn and mangled bodies of Peter Barrie and Peter Reano were found this morning on Bald mountain. They had been missing since Tuesday night. With several other boys they went up the mountain to put off dynamite in celebration of the Fourth.

Before midnight the others returned home, leaving Barrie and Reano to put off the last shot. They failed to get away soon enough, and the bodies were scattered over a distance of 100 yards, and their clothing had been torn from their bodies and caught upon bushes and trees.

TENNIS FINALS LOST BY SUTTON

California Girl Meets Defeat in Two Straight Games at Wimbledon.

DOUGLASS NOW CHAMPION.

She Wins With Scores of 6-3 and 9-7 Over American Girl Who Last Year Won the Trophy.

Wimbledon, England, July 5.—Miss May Sutton of California today lost the tennis championship of Great Britain, which she won last year, being defeated by Miss Douglass by 2 to 1. The scores were 6-3, 9-7.

The English player took the first set somewhat easily, but the American-British champion rallied and made a desperate effort to make up the lost ground and retain the British title. Both played almost entirely from the base line. The only time Miss Sutton played near the net was disastrous, resulting in the loss of a point.

Miss Sutton won the first four games and then Miss Douglass drew level. The games then followed the service to six all. When Miss Douglass was within an ace of winning the match, Miss Sutton gained up, won her service and followed suit by winning Miss Douglass' service, thus taking the lead. The English woman, by a great effort, managed to draw level, and winning the next two games, regained the championship for Great Britain.

Miss Sutton was handicapped by her exertions of yesterday, when she played three hard fought contests.

In the quarter for the championship contest S. H. Smith and Frank I. Riskey beat the Doherty brothers by 3-2. The scores were 6-4, 5-7, 6-2.

In the open ladies doubles, final round, Miss Hilyard and May Sutton beat Mrs. Sterry and Miss Moulton by 2-0, 6-4.

MOTOR CYCLISTS MEET.

Fifth Annual Session Elects Officers At Its Rochester Meeting.

Rochester, N. Y., July 4.—The federation of American Motorcyclists, holding its fifth annual meeting at Rochester, tonight elected the following officers:

Today's events included a road race, when J. H. DeKoster, Springfield, Mass., starting from scratch, attained the record-breaking speed of approximately a mile a minute over a 24-mile course on the New England road.

The time was 2:31.3 for the 24 miles. The course was a three-mile straightaway. The hour national championship was won by S. T. K. Kellogg of Springfield, who won 4:16 miles. The Rozier was second with 4:16 miles.
