PARA, Brazil, 30.—The *Tribuna* newspaper continues to publish violent articles against foreigners, generally, and particularly against the officers of the Portuguese corvette *Sayres*. The people of the city of Paraluha have risen against the foreigners there; the government has sent twenty thousand troops to suppress the demonstration.

LISBON, 30.—The Brazilian government has informed that of Portugal that the newspaper *Tribuna*, of Para, will be prosecuted for its hostile attitude towards Portuguese subjects.

PANAMA, 30.—It is reported that Guzman Blanco, in Venezuela, having pulled down a church to make place for a statue of himself, found a treasure of three hundred thousand under the foundation.

The Llama volcano in Araucano, is in active eruption. A strong shock of earthquake was felt at Angelis, on the 25th of October, which was followed by some terrible showers of rain.

MADRID, 29.—It is said that the army now numbers two hundred thousand men, fully armed, and that there are forty thousand men waiting for arms ordered from the U. S.
