## In Women's World.

For a knife scourer sift the ashes from the range through a fine sleve, and put away in cans. Dip a wet cloth in them and scrub the knives. This is especially good for steel utensils.

For dandellon whe take four quarts dandellon blossoms; one gallon of silng water; let stand three days in cool place and then add the rind of anges and one lemon oil 15 minutes, strain and add pulp

of fruit and three and one-half pounds of loaf sugar. When cool add one-half yeast oake: let stand one week in a cool place; strain and let stand three weeks; strain again and bottle.

A substitute for mending tissue is this. Take a cake of common yellow soap, wet it, and rub over a piece of the goods. Then place the cloth over the torn place in the garment and press with a hot fron.

For glorified hash heat a pint of gravy left from a pot reast, or make a rich brown sauer add a cup each of bolled Spanish chestnuts and French

mushrooms, chopped, a teaspoon each of currant felly and sherry, and large, wafer-thin slices of cold meat. Warm through and serve with points of toast, sliced lemon and watercress.

For mint sandwiches take some mint leaves, wash them, and dry carefully. Chop the mint fine, add a little thick cream, and then spread between thin silees of bread and butter.
