## CHARGE, MURDEROUS ASSAULT

Arrested on Commander Fullam's Order for Attacking a Louisiana Negro Named General Davis.

Puerto Cortez, Honduras, April 29 vbla Mobile, Ala., May 3 .- The chief of police and several policemen of this place are in irons aboard the American gunboat Paducah, charged with murderous assault, and must fac: a trial by court-martial and possble hanging from the yard arm of the Paducah. They were arrested on orders issued by Commander Fullam of the Marietta for attacking a Louisiana negro named attacking a Louisiana hegro named General Davis here on April 27, and perhaps fatally injuring him. A num-ber of Nicaraguan officers and men also were arrested in connection with the affair. These were delivered to the custody of Gen. Estrada, who was ad-vised by Commander Fullam that he would be held responsible for their safe beening. keeping.

keeping. Davis, who is an inspector for the Thacker Brothers' Steamship line, was talking with some negro companions to-day when he was threatened with a machete by a drunken soldier. Davis wrested the weapon away from the man and went into a house nearby. Soon a squad of police and soldiers arrived and arrested him. While being dragged to the cuartel, Davis was beaten into insensibility. Thinking Davis was dy-ing, they took him back to the place of his arrest and threw him down on the ground, refusing to allow his compan-ions to remove him into the shade. Physicians arrived and found him per-haps fatally hurt.

Commander Fullam's orders were sharp and decisive: "Arrest the chief of police," he said, 'and the policemen engaged in the as-sault; put them in irons and send them aboard ship. Arrest the Nicaraguan officers and men engaged in the assault and hold them for orders." It was thought possible that an at-tempt would be made to release the soldiers and police captured by the blue jackets, and additional men were landed from the Paducah and the Ma-rietta. Commander Fullam, finding that the civil authorities were incapable of maintaining regulations or order: that the government of Tegucigalpa was a mere provisional agreement of certain baders that so far gave no evidence of stability, decided to ignore the au-thorities here and recognize the only organized and disciplined force under Gen. Estrada, commanding the Nic-araguan forces, who had in the mean-time returned from an outing. Notice has been served on the Hon-duran and Nicaraguan authorities that reparation would be demanded and panishment should be inflicted upon all of the perpetrators of the outrage. Commander Fullam says if Davis dies the perpetrators will be tried for murder, presumably by court-martial, and the guilty ones hung at the yard arm in front of the port. The Paducah was ready to sail for Ceiba and Truxil-lo, but will remain here for the present. Commander Fullam has placed Capt. M iterhalter in command of the land forces, and he is conducting a vigorous hwestigation of all the details of the Davis affair.

New York, May 4 .- Through Ellis island there passed yesterday 5,355 allens, and thousands more are waiting their turn on vessels in the harbor and yet thousands more are due to arrive with-

thousands more are due to arrive with-in the next two days. The entire force of officials at the im-migrant station are working with might and main to land as soon as possible the many who seek entrance here, but at best it is slow work, for not only has each individual to be registered, but the inspectors must pass upon the desirability of each to enter the coun-try.

desirability of each to enter the coun-try. Those landed yesterday represented nearly every nation of Europe. The bright colors of the new comers from the south countries and the picturesque garb of the northern peasants formed a pleasant picture, while the babel of strangers and the shouling of inspec-tors forming them into groups on the main floor lent additional interest to the scene. Many of the immigrants are Italians. They declare they have been attracted to America by the stories of the general prosperity here, and that many thousands of their countrymen are leaving for this country. They say that in southern Italy many villages have been almost deserted by the popu-lation, so strong is the fever of emigra-tion that has selzed the people.

#### LONG BALLOON VOYAGE.
