

IN IRONS ABOARD GUNBOAT PADUCAH

The Chief of Police and Several Policemen of Puerto Cortez, Honduras.

CHARGE. MURDEROUS ASSAULT

Arrested on Commander Fullam's Order for Attacking a Louisiana Negro Named General Davis.

Puerto Cortez, Honduras, April 29, via Mobile, Ala., May 2.—The chief of police and several policemen of this place are in irons aboard the American gunboat Paducah, charged with murderous assault, and must face a trial by court-martial and possible hanging from the yard arm of the Paducah. They were arrested on orders issued by Commander Fullam of the Marietta for attacking a Louisiana negro named General Davis here on April 27, and perhaps fatally injuring him. A number of Nicaraguan officers and men also were arrested in connection with the affair. These were delivered to the custody of Gen. Estrada, who was advised by Commander Fullam that he would be held responsible for their safe keeping.

Davis, who is an inspector for the Thacker Brothers' Steamship line, was talking with some negro companions to-day when he was threatened with a machete by a drunken soldier. Davis wrested the weapon away from the man and went into a house nearby. Soon a squad of police and soldiers arrived and arrested him. While being dragged to the court, Davis was beaten into insensibility. Thinking Davis was dying, they took him back to the place of his arrest and threw him down on the ground, refusing to allow his companions to remove him into the shade. Physicians arrived and found him perhaps fatally hurt.

Within 19 minutes the blue jackets of the Marietta under Ensign Torasch were on the spot.

Commander Fullam's orders were sharp and decisive.

"Arrest the chief of police," he said, "and the policemen engaged in the assault; put them in irons and send them aboard ship. Arrest the Nicaraguan officers and men upon the assault and hold them for orders."

It was thought possible that an attempt would be made to release the soldiers and police captured by the blue jackets, and additional men were landed from the Paducah and the Marietta. The Paducah moved to a position fronting the Nicaraguan courtiers, while the Marietta covered the courtiers in the port.

Commander Fullam, finding that the civil authorities were incapable of maintaining order, and that the government of Tegucigalpa was a mere provisional agreement of certain leaders that so far gave no evidence of stability, decided to ignore the authorities here and recognize the only organized and disciplined force under Gen. Estrada, commanding the Nicaraguan forces, who had in the meantime retained from an outgoing government.

Noice has been served on the Honduran and Nicaraguan authorities that reparation would be demanded and punishment should be inflicted upon all of the perpetrators of the outrage. Commander Fullam says if Davis dies the perpetrators will be tried for murder, presumably by court-martial, and the guilty ones hung by the yard arm in front of the port. The Paducah was ready to sail for Ceiba and Truxillo, but will remain here for the present. Commander Fullam has paid for the vessel, and he is conducting a vigorous investigation of all the details of the Davis affair.

TAFT WILL BREAK SILENCE ON CANDIDACY QUESTION.

Washington, May 3.—Secy. Taft, it is expected, will break his political silence for the first time since he has been regarded as a prospective candidate for the Republican nomination for the presidency in a speech which he probably will deliver at Tulsa, Okla., on June 6, after the occasion of the assembling of the first Republican state convention. The secretary has accepted an invitation to attend that convention. It is not definitely stated that he is to make a speech then, but it is not doubted that he will do so if requested, nor is it likely that he will fail to extend the necessary invitation.

In the secretary's opinion the present campaign in Oklahoma will be a hot one, and probably will determine for a number of years to come the political complexion of the state. The issues presented are expected to be national in character and it may be possible that Secy. Taft can find much to say to the people of Oklahoma in a convention assembled that will interest them in general Republican principles without in any way bringing in the personal equation.

This visit to Tulsa will be only an incident in a considerable western trip which Secy. Taft is about to take. He probably will discuss economic subjects at the millers' convention at St. Louis on the 20th inst., which naturally should involve allusions to the effect of the completion of the Panama canal upon the important American flour export trade with the orient and the west coast of South America.

After the Oklahoma visit the secretary is going to make an official tour of inspection of the great military posts so that he will be in a position to renew his efforts with Congress at the session in behalf of the creation of great brigade posts and concentration camps with a more comprehensive knowledge of the subject than he had when this project was first broached last year.

SAN DOMINGO RATIFIES TREATY.

Santo Domingo, May 3.—The new treaty between the United States and Santo Domingo, intended to replace the treaty which has been pending before the United States senate for the last two years, was ratified by the Dominican congress today.

CHIEF ARIMAN RESIGNS.

Guatemala City, May 2.—Chief of Police Arim, an American, has resigned and will return to the United States. The government paid him his salary for the time between now and the date his contract expires.

STANDARD OIL'S DEFENSE.

Claimed That the Elkins Act is Unconstitutional.

Chicago, May 3.—In presenting argument today on his motion for a new trial in the Standard Oil rebate case recently decided against that company in the federal court, Atty. John S. Miller declared that the Elkins act as applied to interstate shipments is in violation of the fourteenth article of the constitution of the United States. The attorney announced at the commencement of his argument that without prejudice to the motion of a new trial, he would also move for an arrest of judgment.

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KING EDWARD'S ESCAPE.

Believed an Attempt Was Made to Wreck Train on Which He Was.

Genoa, May 4.—The overheating of an axle compelling the removal of a car from the train on which King Edward was traveling to France, is declared by newspapers here to have been probably an attempt to wreck the train. Before entering the Simplon tunnel the train was stopped as a measure of precaution at Sion and it was found that a grease box on one of the axles was missing. The train had been running at the rate of a hundred kilometers an hour and the axle was white heat. If the train had gone a few miles further the axle might have fused and the cars and the axle was white hot. It is said that the bolts and pins securing the box had been deliberately removed. An inquiry was immediately begun.

JUSTICE WAS SWIFT.

Negro Attacks Girl, is Caught, Tried and Sentenced to 12 Years.

Woodbury, N. J., May 3.—Swift justice was meted out today to Edward M. Edson, a negro, who on Monday night last attacked Miss Dorothy Paris, 19 years old, of Kenosha. Edson was sentenced to 12 years' imprisonment and to pay a fine of \$1,000. This is the extreme penalty.

Miss Paris was crossing a lot near her home when the negro attacked her. Her cries were heard and she was captured. He was badly beaten by his captors before the police took him to a place of safety.

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
