Payson Gambling Case.—A short time since, we published the arrest of a woman in Payson, for keeping a gambling house. We are informed by our Provo contemporary, that the examination of the case came off before Justice Wride on Friday last. A jury having been empannelled, the trial proceeded. The evidence went to show that on the 4th of last month, two or three individuals went into the house of Mrs. Box, and played at dice there, and that at the close of the games, she brought in whisky, which had been ordered and received pay therefor. The case went on till shortly before midnight, when it was given to the jury, which soon returned a verdict of guilty. On Monday judgment was rendered the defendant being fined \$99 and costs. The case was appealed to the District Court.
