French Motor Car.—Col. Clayton is in receipt of a fine foreign automobile from France. He was not required to pay duty as the car had been used over a year, while abroad. Had the car been new, the duty would have been \$2,000.

St. John was shot by Paddy Mulvaney some time back while Mulvaney was established there through the instrumentality of the local Farmers' institute, and which is proving of the greatest benefit to the grangers. JUGGLING FINDS

City Council Will Make Big Hole
In Million Dollar Bond
Fund.

JUVENILE COURT QUARTERED.

Mayor Bransford's Recommendation
That it be Given Auditor's
Office Approved.

Moss financial juggling was indulged in at the council meeting last night. Pat Moran drew a big share of the city's money and when all claims are paid the treasury will look more like a deficit than a bank account. Out of a million dollar bond fund created in 1905, the council awarded Pat Moran \$27,629.63 for the new 26-inch water mains in Fifth South street. This leaves less than \$1,000 in the bond fund in the treasury, entered into between Moran and the city authorities, the city to withhold 15 per cent of the cost. Not only did the council go beyond its authority as expressed in the contract, but there is a shadow on the legal aspect of the matter.

When Pat Moran gets through with his contracts, which are entered into to be paid from the bond fund, he will have \$26,000 coming to him and in order to pay it, the city will have another life-sized overdraft. FIRE PROTECTION IN SALT LAKE

Regular Tours of Inspection Are
Made Each Morning in
Business District.

INFLAMMABLES ARE REMOVED

Theater Protection Is Ample in Big
Playhouses—Firemen in Attendance—Have Asbestos Curtains.

Not many Salt Lake residents know or appreciate the value of fire protection to public buildings and theaters and to the business district generally. It is known that every morning three experienced firemen make an inspection of portions of the business district; that back alleys, cellars and storerooms are examined to see that no rubbish or combustible material is contained therein; that standpipes are inspected and first-escapees at the Salt Lake, Orpheum, Grand and Lyric theaters or more firemen are on duty?

TRIP OF INSPECTION.
Each morning at 9 o'clock an officer of the fire department, accompanied by two men, starts out on an inspection trip. A certain district is marked out and it receives careful attention. If a pile of rubbish or combustible material is found behind a store, or if a cellar is littered with paper, boxes or inflammable stuff, the proprietor of the place is warned to make a clean up at once. If the order is not obeyed he soon finds himself answering a criminal charge.

DOORS SWING OUTWARD.
There is a law here that the doors of all public buildings shall swing outward. This applies to theaters, hotels, churches and school buildings which must have doors that swing outward.

ASBESTOS CURTAINS.
There is also a provision compelling the theaters to have asbestos curtains and to keep them down between acts. This law is also implicitly obeyed in Salt Lake. An ordinance provides that one or more members of the fire department be detailed for duty in the event of a sudden blaze they know exactly what to do. The first thing would be to turn in an alarm. Then one of the firemen would take an axe and chop a hole in the roof, and the other would throw a bucket of water on the fire.

IN CASE OF FIRE.
The Salt Lake theater has excellent fire protection. Besides the big asbestos curtain, there is a chemical outfit and a big line of 2 1/2-inch hose which is regularly tested. There are generally two firemen on duty there. In the event of a sudden blaze they know exactly what to do. The first thing would be to turn in an alarm. Then one of the firemen would take an axe and chop a hole in the roof, and the other would throw a bucket of water on the fire.
