An Iowa Tornado.

DES MOINES, 13.—News of the effect

of the storm last night is slow coming.

About four miles north of Dubuque

five houses were destroyed by the wind,

a man named Higgins fatally and his

wife slightly injured. Their house was

carried away a distance and left under

a heap of lumber.

In Piquette a number of buildings

were demolished and three lives lost.

At Council Bluffs the storm struck

the Deaf and Dumb Institute, tearing

the roof from its moorings and carrying

it a short distance.

The storm at Whiting blew down

houses and barns and severely

injured John Cross, a local farmer.

W. Packard's house was blown down.
