

MARSHAL MAUSS MAKES RECORD

With a Few Deputies He Arrests
One Hundred and Ten
Greeks.

MARCHES THEM OFF TO JAIL.

Captives Taken as They Make Descent
Upon Railroad Tracks in
Hot Coal Car.

Marshal Michael Mauss of Murray well known as a record breaker, has just established a mark which will compare with anything in police history. Sunday a tin Grande Western engine was switching on the high line above and back of Shanty-town, a part of Murray, and while engaged in this work left a car of coal standing on the track. No sooner had the train crew gone down the line on the engine than a small army of Greeks rushed running out of their hovels on the flat below, and climbing to the tracks, started piling coal over the sides of the car. The rocks rolled down the grade into Shanty-town and were splattered away by others below. The attack was progressing rapidly when the guard, mounted on the engine, discovered the situation. Knowing it useless to try to capture any of the foreigners who, in such a crowd, no one attempted to do anything until Sheriff Mauss had been notified of the wholesale robbery.

MAKES BIG HAUL.
With a few deputies the intrepid protector of Murray rushed forth, forcing into the crowd before being covered by the sheriff and his handful of men arrested the coal robbers in line. There were signs of a breakaway but 110 Greeks, knowing the sheriff, either by sight or reputation, thought discretion the better plan and marched rapidly to the city jail. This record-breaking arrest was made at 2:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon and it was not long before six prisoners had been taken. But this is getting ahead of the story.

SIX CONFESS ALL.
When Marshal Mauss and his aides marched through the city with a long procession of Greeks ahead of them, the town was greatly puzzled. When the prisoners reached the jail a serious difficulty arose. Where could all these prisoners be placed? The jail was filled to overflowing and considerable planning was done before room could be found for the mob. When the foreigners were locked up for the night every available office and room had been pressed into use. Six prisoners collapsed, put up \$50 bail and were permitted to go; they were at liberty until the trials begin.

SOME COMPLICATIONS.
When the recording clerk-desk sergeant started taking the names of prisoners he probably didn't realize what was ahead. As each man stepped

up he uttered something like this, "An-dro-ni-ko! By-stand-er-er! De-sh-er-et! De-sh-er-et!" Each name had to be spelled, and it took some time and trouble to get each of the 110 cognomens on the record correctly. When it was done the day book was as full as the city jail. Just what charges will be placed against the men is not known—petty larceny, probably—and just how the courts will handle the 110 cases is something hardly mapped out yet. If each Greek wants to tell his story and a majority cannot speak English, some time may be consumed in trying all. Altogether the arrest and probable complications are interesting. The reason that Marshal Mauss is about to put every member of the Black Hand behind bars is not true, but that he could not do it, as several arrests prove is not the case at all, but simply because he has Greeks and other things to furnish him light recreation.

SAD DEATH.
Irving Morris Brown Succumbs to
Attack of Acute Appendicitis.

Irving Morris Brown, a lad of 18 years, yielded up his life on Sunday, Nov. 24, following an operation for acute appendicitis. The case had progressed so far that the operation was the only means of saving his life but the last effort failed, as illness followed set in and the attack resulted fatally. The young man was exceptionally bright, and his death was a great blow to his family. The funeral services will be held at 10 o'clock tomorrow at the residence of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Brown, 1214 South 10th Street. The body will be interred in the city cemetery.

CAUSES WIFE'S ARREST.
Joseph Kettleson Prefers Charges
Against Spouse and Paramour.

Complaints were passed today from the office of the county attorney, directed against Roy McIntyre and Mrs. Joseph Kettleson, charging both with a statutory offense, alleged to have been committed in this city Nov. 18, 1906.
Mrs. Kettleson is in the county jail having been arrested Saturday night, at the instance of her husband, mention of which has already been made in the columns of the "News." She is alleged to have eloped from one of the houses of the city with McIntyre, the latter assuming the name of O'Brien, the pair taking with them the four-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Kettleson. McIntyre has not yet been apprehended.

GRIND OUT COMPLAINTS.
County Attorney's Office Has a Steadfast Forenoon.

For a short time today the office of County Attorney Willard Hanson was very busy in the issuance of complaints against alleged infractors of the law. Most of the charges preferred were against persons believed to have been responsible for at least some of the holdups, hotel and rooming-house robberies, etc., that have been so prevalent of late.
Of this class were William Irvin and Mike Caus, accused of burglary in the second degree from the fact that they entered Room 12 of the Cullen hotel annex on the night of Nov.

3, with intent to steal, take and carry away, etc.
Joe Donovan and Mike Lynch are called upon to explain why they entered Room 49 of the Utah hotel, on Commercial street, Nov. 21. The charge preferred against the two is burglary in the third degree.
A complaint filed against Richard Deramus is that he held up and robbed, at the point of a pistol, one Daniel Webster, colored, Oct. 28, 1905, taking from him a small sum of money.

CAN TALK WITH PRICE.

Telephone Connection Now Established With Scotland and Vernal.

For the first time, Price, Castle Gate, Winter Quarters, Benfield, Sunnyside, Myton and Vernal were connected with the Bell Telephone system this morning, and General Manager Murray, who is still in Butte, talked from that point to Bishop Miller at Price, and other people in that section. As soon as business conditions in the line will be continued on from Mounds Station, the junction for Sunnyside, eastward to Grand Junction.

IMPRESSIVE FUNERAL.

Impressive funeral services over the remains of Edward Toulson were held in the Thirtieth ward meetinghouse Sunday afternoon. A select quartet consisting of Louis and Leo Bowers, Ross Buchanan and Alice Cottrell rendered several appropriate selections. The opening prayer was offered by Elder John S. Bowers and appropriate remarks touching on the life of the deceased, were made by Elders Charles Cottrell, Jr., Bishop Cutler and Charles Cottrell, Jr. The benediction was by Elder Alexander Buchanan, Jr. The deceased was in his twenty-first year, but had been an invalid the greater part of his life.

CITY COURT IS BUSY.

Three State and Twenty-Five City Cases Constitute Heavy Docket.

This is a busy day for Judge C. B. Dicht in the criminal division of the City court. Three state cases were called this morning and this afternoon there are twenty-five city cases being disposed of. This morning Mike Lynch, charged with burglary in the third degree, entered a plea of not guilty and the case was set for Dec. 11 for hearing.
Richard Demers, charged with robbery, took until Wednesday to plead and was sent to the county jail in default of \$200 bail. Lemmings in charged with holding up and robbing a negro named Daniel Webster of \$125. The bail in the case of Lynch was fixed in the sum of \$500 which the accused was unable to furnish.

MRS. WOOD CALLED HOME.

Death of Last Representative of Active Religious Family.

In the passing of Mrs. Fannie Wood, whose remains were laid to rest in the city cemetery Saturday afternoon, the last representative of a family who for years were moving spirits in the religious affairs of the Fifth ward, has been called home. Mrs. Wood came to America some years ago from England, Utah, where she became a member of the church, remaining here the rest of her days. Mr. Wood, after a short residence here, returned to the east, where he died a few years ago. Mrs. Wood was a sister to Mrs. Elizabeth Clark, wife of George Clark, the veteran Salt Lake barber. Mrs. Wood was without posterity, and her death leaves the last representative of a worthy family.
The funeral services were held Saturday afternoon in the Fifth ward assembly hall, Bishop S. M. T. Seddon presiding. The speakers were Elders Theodore Burton, Alex. Buchanan, Jr., Henry Wallace and Bishop Seddon. Music was furnished by the ward choir, which rendered hymns selected by the deceased before her death. The opening and closing prayers were by Elders Alex. Buchanan, Jr. and Fred C. Reeves, respectively.
