memorial to Congress: WHERMAS, the wool growers of Col-orado, Kansas, Utah, Wyoming, Ne-braska, Idaho, New Mexico and Min-nesota, assembled in convention in the city of Denver the 13th of March, 1844, rowresenting 7 500 (00) sheep, 550 (00).
