

'B' ON THE OATS.

The Mysterious Stamp on the Grain in this Valley.

It is FOUND IN A FIELD at Mill Creek, then Near Liberty Park, Flatly Embossed on the Leaves.

A few days ago the dispatches from Indiana stated that there was considerable excitement in that part of the country because of a peculiar marking which had been discovered on the leaves of oats. It was stated that the letter "B" was stamped on the grain; and the further information was given that the same phenomenon had been observed previously in the year of 1812 and 1813.

Now the smaller letter has been found on the grain in Salt Lake valley. It was first observed at Mill Creek, six miles south of the city, and today an investigation was made in an oat field immediately east of Liberty Park. The result was that the marking was identical with the one in Indiana.
