### REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH.

To the Board of County Commission-The following report for the year ers: 1903 of the health board speaks well for the general good health existing, and which has prevailed in the several precincts in Weber county outside of Og-den City. There have been 54 cases of smallpox, 58 of typhoid fever, 3 of pneumonia, 10 of scarlet fever, 3 of diphtheria, and 223 cases of measles; wo deaths from scarlet fever and three from measles. As will be observed, the mortality has been remarkably light, no deaths occurring from the more contagious diseases of smallpox, diphtheria and pneumonia. It is also very gratifying to find that the terrors attending the presence of that dread disease diphtheria in families have been largely modified and almost entirely overcome by the efficacious and successful use of antitoxine. Not a case of death out of 33 patients afflicted has occurred. The

totals are seggregated from the reports received as follows: Huntsville-Twenty cases of small-

pox, five of typhoid fever, two of pneu-monia, one of scarlet fever and 205 of measles. Liberty-Nine of smallpox, two of

scarlet fever. Hooper -Thirty-two of typhoid fever and six of scarlet fever. Plain City-Two of typhoid fever. Poplar-Two of typhoid fever and one of pneumonia.

Uintah-Two of typhoid fever, 12 of neasles and three of diphtheria. Riverdale—Five of diphtheria.

Wilson-One of typhoid fever and three of scarlet fever. West Weber-One of smallpox, one of

typhoid, six of measles and five of diphtheria. Marriott-One of smallpox.

Harrisville-Two of smallpox and six scarlet fever. Farr West-One of diphtheria

North Ogden-Ten cases of typhoid fever and 17 of diphtheria,
