

MANY GENERALS ON RETIRED LIST.

The Number Has Now Reached
Two Hundred and Sixty-Six.

MAY CUT DOWN THEIR PAY.

Topheavy Army Will Receive Some Attention During This Session of Congress.

Washington, Feb. 20.—The top heavy army will receive some attention in this Congress. It may not be that the office of lieutenant general of the army will be abolished, although there is a strong feeling that the great office created to honor such soldiers as Scott, Grant, Sherman and Sheridan should not become common property of a dozen men whose names will scarcely figure in history. The idea of those who are trying to have the office abolished is that it should be reserved for men who have particularly distinguished themselves in command of great armies on the battlefield. Before this office can be abolished there will be on the retired list of the army as lieutenant generals six men, and it will take a very close student of recent events to tell wherein any of them earned that title in view of the fact that Thomas, Meade, Burnside, Hooker, Crook and a dozen other distinguished officers of the civil war never held a higher rank than major general.

THE RETIRED LIST.

Besides these six lieutenant generals there are about 25 major generals and 200 brigadier generals on the retired list. With eight major generals and 20 brigadier generals on the active list and numerous promotions for retirement of these grades frequently being made the retired list is becoming something of a menace to the army, and many officers fear that if it keeps on increasing an effort may be made to abolish it or cut down the pay of retired officers. Restrictions are proposed in the army appropriation bill which may tend to prevent large additions to the retired list in the future.

"ROOSEVELT LUCK AGAIN."

"Roosevelt luck again" was a remark made by a Republican not over friendly to the president when he heard that the Democratic senators were holding a caucus to unite their party against the policy of the president in Santo Domingo. "Could anything be more opportune?" he continued. "Just as we were all split to pieces on everything the Democrats determine to unite against the president, which will force us to get together for him. Sometimes I think that there is going to be a change in Roosevelt luck, but I am now convinced that he is a man of destiny."

CRANE'S PATERNALISTIC BILL.

Senator Crane of Massachusetts, a man who never seeks notoriety to any great extent, finds himself the subject of considerable public discussion because he introduced a bill to establish a "children's bureau" in the interior department, which bureau was charged with the duty of "investigating and reporting upon all matters pertaining to the welfare of children and child life, and shall especially investigate the questions of infant mortality, the birth rate, physical degeneracy, orphanage, juvenile delinquency and juvenile courts, desertion and illegitimacy, dangerous occupations, accidents and disease of children of the working classes, employment, legislation affecting children in the several states and territories and such other facts as have bearing upon the health, efficiency, character and training of children." Some who criticize this measure say that Crane introduced it to secure facts to back up the theories of the president regarding race suicide.

RAILWAY MAIL RATES.

For several years Frank Pettigrew, when a senator from South Dakota, made an earnest endeavor to secure a reduction in the amount of money paid railroads for the transportation of mails. There was a long drawn out investigation of the subject by a joint committee of the senate and house. Volumes of testimony were taken and never read, and the net result was some speeches in Congress and the fact that in the same direction is being made, or perhaps it would be better to say that there is agitation in that direction. It began about the time the passes were being curtailed on different railroads in the country and may not have been a coincidence, but a desire to get even.

A BIT MIXED.

Representative Richardson of Alabama, while discussing the railroad rate bill in the house, perpetrated an Irish bull. "Mr. Chairman," he said, speaking of the work of the committee, "there are a great many features in this legislation that we had a great deal of trouble that are not in this bill." He said that the committee had eliminated some of the objectionable features.

RE-ENACTING THE CONSTITUTION

Some land bill was being considered in the senate which caught the eye of Senator Spooner of Wisconsin. "I notice a clause in the bill," he said, "where the constitution is re-enacted very industrially, and I question the necessity."

"It is nothing new to re-enact the constitution," bitingly remarked Senator Beveridge of Indiana. "I will say to the senator that it is done here all the time."
