

Ruins in Egypt and Mexico Are Contemporaneous

BEFORE summing up the facts brought out in these articles, they would seem incomplete without one more evidence in favor of the antediluvian age being the builders of the pyramids and other ruins of the present and other ruins of very ancient date, found either in Mexico or Egypt for they are evidently all antediluvian and belong to the latter part of that period, say, from the year 1000 after the creation to the flood which occurred about 1650 B. C. As the account of Adam's children and the children of the patriarchs from Adam to Noah is very brief in the Bible, it does not appear to us as being clear proof of a very widespread population. These, however, were not obedient to the Lord as a rule, and it is evident Adam was very much; hence when Cain was born, Eve believed she had received one who would be obedient to the Lord. In this she was disappointed.

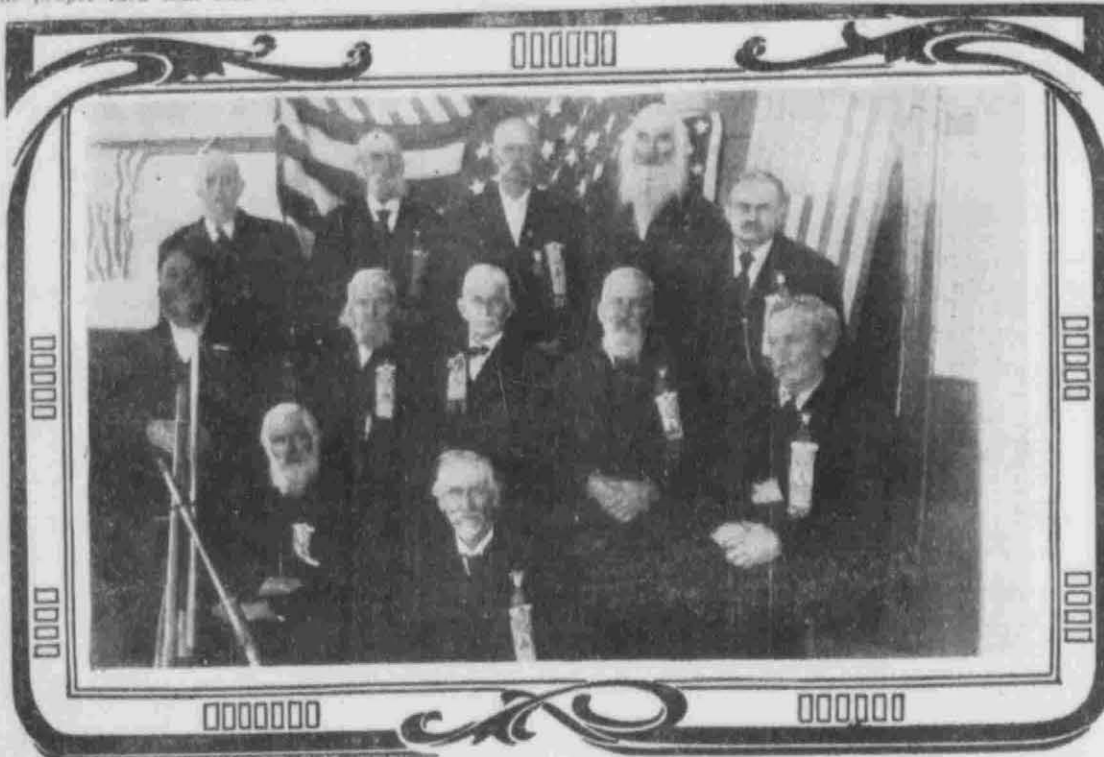

begin to be very numerous, and were a mixture of the seed of all the children of Adam except the children of Cain who were black.
