This correspondent encloses in his letter a form which he is obliged o make out yearly. In this he applie for a license to transact business as merchant, at a certain location, for a

certain specified number of months, commencing on a certain day of the to hte cash value of all goods, wares and merchandise in his possession or under his control, whether owned by nim, or consigned to him for sale, and o declare that it does not exceed a

tain number of dollars. This must be sworn to before a no-This must be sworn to before a no-tary public, and the money must ac-company the application before the license can be issued. If this meets with the aproval of the powers-that-be in Sait Lake City, he gets a license, which certifies that he has paid to the city treasurer, a certain number of dollars, and has complied with the or-dinance in force, and is thereby li-censed to transact business as a mer-chant for the term specified. The li-cense, which he sends us for examinacense, which he sends us for examina-tion is for a term of three months. commencing and ending on certain dates. This is signed by the mayor, and attested by the recorder. This license is not transferrable. This ear as a license tax. Besides this e has to pay regular taxes. This, he believes, is peculiar to his own city. I know of no cities in Massachusetts where a dealer in merchandise, hav-ing a fixed place of business, is obliged to have a license, except in the case of a liquor dealer, or a dealer in certain specified goods, about which there are special laws—such goods there are special laws such goods as are dangerous or inflammable, or where, for some obvious reason, it is desirable to have these places laid under special obligations and super-vision for the safety of the neighbors. Of course there are licenses required of peddlers, or itinerary merchants-

The stationer who pays his taxes on the stock of goods in his store, does his share to pay the public expenses, but the man who peddles lead pencils anywhere and everywhere on the street, might stand in front of the stationer's store and take trade away from him; and could sell cheaper because he has no rent to pay. It is, therefore, mani-festly just that if the pedlar is to ply his business he should pay taxes; and this takes the form of a license. This may be a small matter, but, of course, is a matter of principle. There is no reason why a city should compel every merchant to pay a license tax in addi-tion to his regular income or merchandise taxes, it is certainly an additional burden, which, under ordinary circumstances, the merchant should not be

easily reached, to pay their share of the taxation, which every city must

obliged to bear. Doubtless there are, in various parts of the country, cities and towns which take every means they can of collect. ing money from the merchants by spe-cial taxation, as well as general taxation; though why some of them do so is beyond the ken of the average tion; citizen. Most municipalities have hea-vy expenses, and need the additional income which they gather from these licenses; though it is simply a case of robbing Peter to pay Paul, to re-duce the general rate of taxation, and then mulci the merchants an extra tax. in the shape of license fees. If these license fees were abolished, possibly the ncense ters were abounded, possibly the general tax rate might be raised, and fall equally upon all the citizens, which would certainly be more just and right than piling an extra tax on the mer-chants, for it is the merchants of the city who give it its real estate value; it is the merchants of the city who taxs city who give it its real estate value; it is the merchants of the city who pays its taxes; and it is the merchants of a city who should be favored in every way possible by the municipalities.
