Editor Deseret News: Yesterday morning, between seven and eight o'clock, I was busily engaged in the garden, when I was startled by the "whiz" of a bullet, which passed near me. Soon after, while walking towards the house, I, from some cause, I know not what, stopped, and at that instant a second bullet passed in front of me, which, had I continued one step further, would undeubted have went through my lungs. 
