SERIOUS FIRE AT COKEVILE.

Stoner Hotel Burned, Loss \$20,000-

Narrow Escape of Guests. Evanston, Wyo., Dec. 2.—Shortly af-ter midnight last night, fire broke out at Cokeville, this county, in Stoner's hotel, supposedly caused by a defective furnace.
