## LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**THEATRICAL.**—Mr. Hardie had a pretty good benefit last night, being his last appearance, at least for a season, on the boards of our Theatre. "Jack Cade," the piece selected for the occasion, was performed very well. Mr. Hardie's "Jack Cade" was a good piece of acting. Kate Denin made a very good "Marianne," which she played in her usual clever manner. Messrs. McKenzie, Lindsay, Graham and Thorne, enacted the characters of "Lacy," "Lord Lay," "Lord Clifford" and "Wat Worthing," contributed much to the success of the piece.

At the conclusion of the last act, Kate Denin and Mr. Hardie were called before the curtain, when the latter briefly took leave of his patrons and friends and wished them "good bye."

"Jenny Lind" was relished as much as ever, although it has been played several times of late. Kate Denin's singing was very sweet and plaintive. Mr. Marzetti's "Gambler" and Mr. Hardie's "Baron Saugstaff Beery" were well done.

To-night, "She Stoops to Conquer" will again be performed, with Kate Denin as "Miss Hardcastle" and Mr. Wilson as "Young Marlow," with the entire cast of the piece as on the former occasion of its production. The farce of the "Two Poles" concludes the entertainment.

**NEW GOVERNOR OF UTAH.**—Our readers will notice in to-day's dispatches that President Grant has nominated Colonel J. Wilson Shaffer, of Illinois, as Governor of Utah. His appointment has been noted for some time in official circles at Washington.

Elder John Taylor, of the Quorum of the Twelve Apostles, was also present, and filled the hearts of the saints with joy with his inspired words of counsel and consolation. In the afternoon the two choirs assembled in the New Meeting House, when they sang the songs of Zion to their hearts' content, and in the evening the pleasures of the morning meeting were again enjoyed.
