The McDonald Case Proceeded With Today.

DR. MABRY WANTS A CONTINUANCE.

At He's Too Poor to Pay the Expenses of Trial—He Always Wins.

Good Reputation Till Now.

There was a large attendance at the opening of the Third district court this morning in the proceedings in the McDonald case. Chief Justice Bentli occupied the bench. Following are the proceedings:

The first was an application by Attorney Goudwin with an affidavit concerning the case of the G. & H. Co. Dr. W. D. Mabry, and read a number of letters from Iowa and Illinois inciting Dr. Mabry's practice and character while in the capacity of minister in the M. E. church during a period of twenty-five years. He is now residing at Paxton, Ill., and all his income at the present time is the wages of his son, which only amounts \$1 per week. Owing to his general condition he could not be present to meet the expenses of his trial. He therefore asks that this case be postponed till the next term or next. He is now acting as a traveling agent for New York firm.

Prosecuting Attorney Hawal opposed the motion, and thought the defendant would furnish the money. Dr. Mabry's voice should be given the right to speak. The motion was denied.

Charles Moore testified. The reputation of Beckerson was bad. Had been told he was a drunkard and a scoundrel. Was not in business but was not present.

Dr. Herriman testified that Mr. Beckerson had been drinking heavily and was a scoundrel and a drunkard. He denied it.

Judge Powers took the stand. He denied having a gun in about the same time as the witness.

Mr. G. H. Beckerson was called by the prosecution. Knew he was general reputation to be good. Never heard of his having been accused of being a scoundrel, a drunkard, or anything of the kind.

On the opening of court this afternoon Mr. Powers was recalled by the prosecution. He did not see Beckerson with any weapon in his hand as he walked into the house and he supposed it was a gun.

Charles Moore denied having sold to Dr. Mabry his gun, and said he was not in his possession, throw the case may be wished.

Mr. Jones was the next witness. He knew Beckerson's reputation. It was good.

Mr. Bond testified—Lived in Center Ward. Saw McDonald there on the occasion of the trouble between the plaintiff and defendant. The shooting occurred about three-quarters of an hour. Knew Beckerson's reputation.

Charles Moore—Testified. The reputation of Beckerson was bad. Had been told he was a scoundrel and a drunkard. Was not in business but was not present.
