The Massachusetts society has in press, in pamphlet form, a syllabus on civil service reform, written by Professor Salmon, which will be sent to clubs throughout the country.

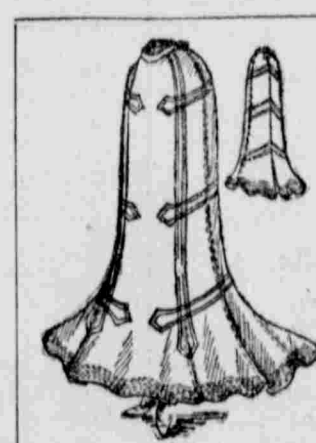
