LOCAL BRIEFS

The University club will give a smoker Saturday night, Nov. 19, when there will be vaudeville and a big time.

W. F. Dille of this city has bought from the Home Trust & Savings company 80 acres in Blaine county, Ida., for \$2,200, for investment purposes.

The board of governors of the Real Estate association is discussing this afternoon projects for enlarging the usefulness of the real estate bureau of information.

E. H. Pollee has sworn to a complaint charging his employee, P. L. Nelson, with embezzling \$730.25 between Jan. 1 and Nov. 17. Nelson was a trusted agent in the employ of Pollee.

The wife of Councilman J. H. Preece was given a surprise birthday party last evening by many friends, and her congratulations the evening was spent in music, cards and refreshments.

The annual banquet of the Commercial club which is held during this month has been postponed in order that it may be merged into the celebration attending the opening of the new line through to Los Angeles.

The street car men's union gave a well attended ball last night in aid of the car men's military band. The union is planning for a social and benevolent association which shall care for the sick and provide for the helpless.

F. von Postels, a St. Petersburg architect, and Herr Anton von Aysberg of Leipzig, Austria, are at the Wilson, having stopped over in this city en route to San Francisco. They are in this country for purposes of study and observation.

Miss Edith Beers of California died yesterday afternoon at the residence of her uncle, 335 Erie street, having come here three months ago for her health. Funeral services were held this afternoon from the residence, and the remains were later shipped to San Francisco for interment.

The many friends of Miss Margaret Summerhays will be pleased to learn that the operation she underwent recently at the Unity hospital for the removal of an abscess on her face, was entirely successful, and she was taken to her home yesterday. Dr. Anderson performed the operation.

The first instalments of stories and poems for the Christmas News prizes are beginning to be received. County Attorney Whitaker has issued a complaint against P. L. Nelson charging him with embezzlement. The complaint was sworn to by E. H. Pollee who charges that Nelson came into the possession of \$730.25 belonging to him which he appropriated to his own use. The defendant will be given a preliminary hearing before Judge Dishi.

Steward Thomas McKean of the city quarantine station, trapped a big coyote yesterday, near his chicken pen, and thought to kill it with rocks, but failing in this, and after barely escaping being bitten, McKean got him a baseball bat, and batted the life out of the coyote. The animal had been lying slyly on McKean's chickens.

The lucern seed crop has proven the best of the history of the state, so it is reported, and local prices have been run up so high that the German seed has been run into this market in large quantities. This has resulted in a weakening of the Utah market and prices are quoted as likely to fall. Extra choice stock is selling today at 7 to 10 cents.

The Knights of Pythias in this city are rapidly increasing in number. The Rocky Mountain lodge has just initiated 14 candidates. The Lincoln lodge is 12 stronger in membership this week, and the Calanthe lodge took in six new members last meeting, and as many more are ready for the next initiation. Members of the order are making great exertions to enlarge the membership, and many desirable men are being brought into the Pythian fold.

The Young Men's Republican club gave a reception last evening to the Republican county committee in the Atlas block. There was an informal program, consisting of a vocal solo by M. Dibble, piano solo by William Dunn and speeches by Parley P. Christensen, J. U. Eldredge, Jr., Harry Joseph, Samuel Parry of Sandy, Charles Roberts of Bingham, Judge Theodosius Bolton and M. Deolittle of Los Angeles. Refreshments were served.

The engineering parties who have been checking up on the preliminary surveys on the local reservation, returned to this city last evening, and will spend the winter working up their notes. The surveys have been out for five months in the wilderness, and their personal appearance would indicate as much. A great deal of the reservation is so mountainous that it can never be settled, or utilized for any other purpose than quarrying and scenic impressions.

The Commercial club's committee on manufactures and new industries concludes that the establishment in or near this city of a canning factory and fruit evaporator would be a good thing and will do all in its power to push the proposed scheme. This will take care of all the extra horticultural products in the city, and will also give the city a new industry which will be called to decide whether they prefer that the proposed industry be operated on the co-operative plan, or be conducted by independent capital.

COUNCIL TO TAKE HAND.

Will Pass Upon the Question of Sidewalk Grades Hereafter.

The city council committee on streets, after making a tour of the section of the city where new sidewalks have been laid, will recommend to the council that in the future the matter of grades for the laying of walks will be passed upon by the council before the work is done.

This will give property owners an opportunity to protest against any of the unusual grades and thereby prevent considerable damage to their property. The committee will also recommend that the grade at Tenth East and Fifth South remain as it is. The sidewalk at Third and O streets will be filled up and a new one laid at the city's expense. The walk in front of the Fifth East hotel will be restored to its established grade and the walk laid at once. There will be no change in the grade of Quince street. The committee will make another tour of inspection and recommend other changes to remedy the defects in the new grades.

The Protection of Commerce.

Notwithstanding peace tribunals war remains the ultimate resort of national disagreement, writes Michael White in The Four Track News. The motive of it, however, is no longer for the subjugation of races, or the possession of thrones, but the protection or extension of commerce. Hence as we pass the threshold of the age of commerce, we may remark as not without a significant bearing upon the future, that monsters as our battleships, the Leviathans of the deep are our merchants, competing, not with torpedoes and shells, but in speed, capacity and accuracy.

If some there are who say the battle ship has reached its highest development, to give place to fleets of smaller craft, no voice is heard venturing the same opinion of our merchantmen.

Hence it is our merchant vessels rather than our battleships which typify the advance in the direction of universal peace and civilization.—Editorial from The Chicago Evening Post.
