COUNCIL TO TAKE HAND.

Will Pass Upon the Question of Sidewalk Grades Hereafter.

The city council committee on streets, after making a tour of the section of the city where new sidewalks have been laid, will recommend to the council that in the future the matter of grades for the laying of walks will be passed upon by the council before the work is done.

This will give property owners an opportunity to protest against any of the unusual grades and thereby prevent The committee will also recommend that the grade at Tonth East and Fifth South remain as it is. The sidewalk at Third and O streets will be filled up and a new one laid at the city's expense. The walk in front of the Fifth East hotel will be restored to its established grade and the walk laid at once. There will be no change in the grade of Quince street. The committee will make another tour of inspection and recommend other changes to remedy

the defects in the new grades.
