**LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.**

**SNOW.**—The snow drift on the top of the mountain between Helena and Deer Lodge, Mont., is said to be thirty feet in depth.

**NEW DAILY.**—A new paper has been started at Deer Lodge, Montana. It is called the "Daily Independent" and is published by E. J. D. Stewart, writing from Helena, Kan. Co., on the 18th inst., says: "There is some sickness in our town; the measles being in several families. The rest of the people are in good health. We have had a fine shower lately, which is bringing up our wheat."

**A NOTORIOUS BEAR KILLER.**—A Los Angeles paper, of the 18th inst., says: "The bear, known as the club foot, which has been for years the terror of the Los Angeles mountains, and for which a reward of \$1,000 has been standing for some time, was found dead in the Tejon mountains, and all indications show that it is the same bear which so fearfully mangled Searles a few weeks since.  Fall grain looks excellent. School meetings are being held in five districts, for upping the principle of taxation to support schools, which is meeting with favor.

 Improvements are going on in building, fencing, planting shade-trees, graveling side walks, etc., and the farmers are putting in their crops.

**PATRON, 14.**  
 Last night, between the hours of twelve and one, a man, on horseback, rode up to Bishop Fairbank's window and fired three shots from a revolver into his bedroom. The Bishop, who had heard his gun open, and some one on horseback ride into his yard, had risen and was standing at the window when the shots were fired, which passed directly over his head. It was too dark for him to distinguish more than the outline of a man and horse, and he has no idea who the desperado was. The affair, which is a mystery, but every measure possible will be adopted to discover the would-be assassin and bring him to justice.

**BEAVER, 15.**  
 Gold was yesterday exhibited in the Co-operative store, which had been discovered in the old lead mine, near Minersville, Beaver Co., at a depth of 75 feet. It exists in the lead, the quartz, and is composed and left it among a substance resembling clay.

**CENTRAL CITY, April 18.**  
 There has been a terrible snow storm for the last three days, with every appearance of a lengthy duration, there are no reports up to-day, on account of the storm. Parties report that the mines are looking well. The snow is so deep to admit of more than a very little prospecting. Several persons have started out, but they have no doubt will prove excellent, as soon as the snow gets off so they can commence working.

**REDUCING OIL.**—We had a call yesterday morning from C. W. Easton, Esq., of San Francisco, who has imported a mill to this Territory for the purpose of working talena ores by the wet separating process, a process which is attended with the best results, being, according to Mr. Easton's statement, adopted for the separating of lead, silver, copper, and all metals at one operation. It answers admirably for ores which are of the value of forty or four hundred dollars per ton. He estimates that fifty per cent can be made out of these ores, and the lead and silver be shipped in a pure condition. The difficulty of working ores under the old process is in smelting or separating the metals, which is usually beset with when it is understood that lead melts at 610 and silver at 1900. The best necessary to melt the latter, of course, causes the former to pass off in vapor. By Mr. Easton's process he claims that this loss is avoided.

**ANTI INCOME TAX ASSOCIATION.**—We received by mail, this morning, a copy of a resolution and address of the late organized Anti-Income Tax Association of New York. The resolution is as follows: "Resolved, That proceedings be taken to organize Associations in other cities and towns throughout the United States to cooperate with this Association in carrying out the objects for which it is organized, with the view of forming the different organizations into a United Anti-Income Tax Association. And that to carry this resolution into effect, an Address be issued, signed by this Committee, inviting individuals in all of the cities and towns in the United States to form an Association, and that this address be published in the newspapers of this city, and distributed to other cities and towns in the United States, and by Miron Winslow, Sec'y."

The address purports to show the unconstitutionality of the tax in question and gives a general invitation to individuals in all of the cities and towns in the United States to form an Association, as indicated in the resolution, to unite in having the burden removed. The address is dated April 18th and is signed by Nathaniel Sande, Benjamin H. Sherman, Paul N. Spofford, William H. Gales, and Anson P. Stokes, who constitute the executive committee, and by Miron Winslow, who is the Secretary.
