

## TAFTS ARRIVE AT WOODBERRY POINT

President and Wife Welcomed as Full-Fledged Citizens of Town of Beverly.

WILL SPEND SUMMER THERE.

Attended First Parish Church, Sitting in the Fifth Pew from the Front.

Beverly, Mass., July 4.—President and Mrs. Taft arrived at their summer home at Woodberry Point at 9 a. m. today from Washington, after an uneventful trip. President Taft was welcomed as a full-fledged resident of Beverly. The mayor and postmaster called to pay their respects and to make the official greeting. Business buildings were decorated. Nearly the entire city had intended meeting the president at the station, but he came earlier than expected.

Later, the president attended church in Beverly, and throughout the service the office was crowded. The road leading past the secluded park where the president's summer home is located was crowded with sightseers. Two attendants and several dozen secret service men were on guard.

TAFT'S SUMMER HOME.

President Taft came to Beverly at this time to bring Mrs. Taft to their summer home. Although the trip from Washington was tiring, Mrs. Taft stood the journey remarkably well, and later in the day took a short automobile ride with the president. Mr. Taft believes that the invigorating air of the sea will quickly restore Mrs. Taft to complete health. She will endeavor to have as quiet a summer as possible, and the president, too, when he finally takes up his abode here, will try to have as complete a vacation as work on several plans of governmental reform, which he has in mind, will allow. The president leaves early tomorrow for Boston, whence he goes to Norwich to participate in the celebration of the two hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the founding of the league. He then goes to Lake Champlain for the tercentenary celebration there, and will reach Washington late in the afternoon of July 9, to remain until the end of the congressional session.

The president will not venture a guess today as to the date of the adjournment, but expressed himself as more than pleased with the progress in the senate during the last few days. President Taft's summer home is known locally as the Evans cottage, and is situated near the end of Woodberry Point, which projects far out into Salem bay and forms the northern boundary for Beverly harbor. The cottage is set among towering elms, the view from its wide verandas commanding a splendid sweep of wood. The picturesque bay, dotted here and there with rugged, rocky islands, offers a marine picture of rare attractiveness.

Hundreds of little sloops and other craft spread their sails before the breeze and went dancing in and out of the harbor. The president's yacht, which will remain here throughout the summer, was anchored near the point. Far out in Marblehead harbor the gray lines of the battleship Minnesota were distinguished.

AT PARISH CHURCH.

The church where the president attended services today at 10:30 a. m. is the oldest in Beverly, the First Parish church, organized in 1607. The president was accompanied by Mrs. Louis More, Mrs. Taft's sister, and Capt. Archibald Butt, his military aide. He sat in the fifth pew from the front. The minister, the Rev. Benjamin R. Binkley, made reference to the president's arrival in Beverly, and in special prayer asked that God might continue to give him guidance. Dr. Binkley declared that the "old north shore" had known two presidents—Washington and Harrison—and was now honored in welcoming a third.

The president was warmly applauded as he left. With Mrs. More, Mr. Taft

motored over to Beverly Farms, to visit Mrs. Mabel Boardman.

The president, after Congress adjourns, expects to remain in Beverly until Sept. 19, and then will start on his projected trip west.

### GERMAN TRANS-PACIFIC LINE PROPOSED

Victoria, B. C., July 4.—News was brought by the steamer Empress of Japan, which arrived from the Orient late yesterday, that liners are to be built by Germans for the projected Chinese trans-Pacific and coastwise shipping line. The line is to operate steamships to San Francisco and not to Puget Sound, according to advices received here.

The Chinese board of posts and communications has proposed to float a large shipment company with an enormous capital to start regular steamer service on the rivers and along the Chinese coast and to run steamers to Singapore, Java, Australia, San Francisco, Yokohama and Bombay. The capital is to be contributed by the government and merchants equally, and the concern will be under their joint management in order to be given to a German firm for ten steamers.

### NEGRO ENUMERATORS.

May Not be Sent Into Homes of Southern Whites to Take Census.

Washington, July 4.—Concerned about what they suppose to be the possibility that negroes may be sent into the homes of white residents of the South as enumerators to gather information for the thirteenth decennial federal census, Democratic members of Congress will urge President Taft to give instructions that only white enumerators shall be employed in districts south of the Mason and Dixon line. Representatives of the southern states in Congress say they have little hope of preventing the negroes unless the president interposes. It is desired by southern congressmen that negroes be employed only for sections where non-white residents reside. As passed by the house the census bill provides that the enumerators should be appointed by the president.

### A CONVENTION OF THE DEAF.

Louisville, Ky., July 5.—A convention which will begin its sessions here this afternoon will not be disturbed by its deliberations by Fourth of July noises. It is the National Fraternal Society of the Deaf, in fourth biennial assembly, and its purpose is to promote the interests of its members in social, industrial and educational ways.

### FIRE FOR HIS ENEMY, KILLED HIS SON

Pueblo, Colo., July 4.—Henry Reinhardt, Jr., 13 years old, of Arday, is dead, the victim of a bullet fired by his father and intended for a bitter enemy of the elder Reinhardt. The lad died this morning in horrible agony from blood poisoning, which set in following the fatal wound.

Reinhardt and a neighbor named Mai had been bitter enemies for some time. Wednesday night the lad was playing about the family yard and the father, thinking him to be Mai, pouncing about the premises, opened fire with a shotgun. The father is heart-broken over the affair.

### FOR ESTABLISHMENT OF A CUSTOMS COURT

Washington, July 4.—Agreement to stand by the action of the tariff bill providing for the establishment of a customs court, as originally reported, was reached today by the senate committee on finance. The provision has been singled out for attack in the senate.

It has been charged by opponents of the new court that its personnel has been agreed upon already. This was denied by Senator Aldrich, chairman of the committee, who added that he knew President Taft will select the best men who can be found to fill these places if the new court is created.

The charge that the creation of the court would be a reflection upon the judiciary which has heard customs cases in the past was also denied by Mr. Aldrich. Mr. Aldrich said customs cases inevitably raise questions of technical character and that they

### should be tried before men who possess full knowledge of the tariff laws and the methods resorted to for the evasion of these laws.

President Taft is in sympathy with the efforts to establish a new court competent to deal with all phases of customs litigation, according to Mr. Aldrich. The latter said also that the chief objection to the establishing of the court comes from attorneys who receive about \$1,000,000 a year in New York City alone, because of court rulings inconsistent with the intent of the tariff law.

He made a speech to the children and incidentally gave his approval to the "same Fourth" idea.

"I want to tell you that joining this Sunday school was the best thing I ever did," he said.

"And this is the happiest Fourth I have spent in a long time."

"It's too bad we haven't any fire-crackers," exclaimed an urchin. "Oh, no," cried Mr. Rockefeller. "You might get blown up if you had."

"When I came to Cleveland a boy, 14 years old, I was attending school and boarding at an old house on Erie street," he said. "I went past that house yesterday and I recalled old times. But the fortunate thing for

me was that my landlady told me that Deacon Sked had a Sunday school class and I ought to join. This was the beginning of my life in the Sunday school and church and I have been happy ever since. My friends, what varied experiences we have. Some of us complain of the trials we have; some of us even of the sunshine that comes into our lives. We should all be happy.
