PROTHERO ENTERS SUIT.

Files Complaint Against Utah Light & Railway Co. to Collect Reward.

The legal battle for the reward offered Secretary's Statement Sets Forth 42 for information leading to the arrest

and conviction of the murderer of Amasa L. Gleason and Thomas B. Brighton, two street car employes, on the night of Jan. 6, has been commenced in the district court by Percy L. Prothero against the Utah Light and Railway company. The complaint was filed yesterday afternoon by the attorney for Prothero. The amount involved in this action is \$1,000, but is thought that similar actions will be brought against the state, county and city, if necessary, to collect the total sum of \$1,200 offered by them as a reward for the apprehension of the murderer of

the two men. It is alleged in the complaint filed yesterday that the company offered a eward of \$1,000 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the murderer and plaintiff, relying upon said reward, gave the police information which lead to the arrest of James M. Shockley, who was last Saturday con-

victed in the district court of the murder of Gleason. Plaintiff has demanded the payment of the reward, but defend-ant has refused to pay it. Hence judgement is asked against defendant for \$1,000, together with interest, costs of suit and attorney's fees.

The company refused to pay the reward to Prothero for the reason that he, shortly after the arrest of Shockley and himself, assigned his interest in the money to the widows of the murder Prothero is now in Idaho Falls ed men. but will return for the trial of the case,

Lodges and 2,316 Members in Utah.

At yesterday afternoon's session of the Grand Lodge of Odd Fellows Grand Secretary P. A. Simpkin reported 42 lodges with a total membership of 2316 Jan, 1, last, which had been increased to date by four lodges and to over 2,500 in membership during the year, \$12,010,-25 had been paid for relief. The total receipts were \$39,724.77. The invested funds of subordinate lodges were \$95,145.40 and the invested funds of the grand lodge were \$3,300 Grand Treasurer A.
