Chancellor of the Exchequer Goshen Submits the Budget and Gives Some Explanations.

## THE NEWFOUNDLAND QUESTION IN THE HOUSE OF LORDS.

## THE ENGLISH BUDGET.

Submitted to the Committee on Home Affairs.

LONDON, April 21.—The budget was submitted to the Commons this afternoon by Goshen, Chancellor of the exchequer. He said there was an excess of £1,700,000 over the amount which he suggested in 1850. He added, however, that there was no certainty that the progressive increase would be maintained, and that the amount had increased £300,000. No less than £30,000 of the surplus arises from the internal revenue duty on tobacco products. There had been an increase in consumption during the year of 10,000,000 gallons of home-made spirits, tobacco, and gin, £27,000.

Referring to the condition of the national debt, Goshen said, taking into consideration the diminished liability on the terminated annuities, the sum outstanding last year was £5,120,000, making the receipts over £10,000,000 during the time the present administration had been in office.

After giving the details on abroad, Goshen recapitulated the idea that the Government was pledged to carry out the scheme of purchase of public houses. If it raised the duties indefinitely, it would be assigned to an excellent purpose, that of technical education, as regards to the coming generation.

LONDON, April 21.—The premier of Newfoundland, Sir William Wallace, in behalf of the Newfoundland delegates, appeared before the House of Lords and presented the proposals of the Newfoundland legislature to pass an amicable decision authorizing the execution of the year's arbitration claim of an award of arbitration committee within the treaties and declarations.
