FIGURES THAT STAND.

When Mr. Hall took the floor he answered in detail every question pro-pounded by the other side, and the fig-ures he submitted were absolutely un-controvertible. The first figures atcontrovertible. The first figures at-tacked by the majority was the sum of \$160,344.65, given as taxes assessed prior to 1908. Mr. Hall pointed out that the special auditor's report gave the amount at the beginning of the year at upwards of \$199,000. This was done to make a good showing for the admin-istration. The minority considered that the figures were entirely too high, and therefore cut out \$39,000, leaving \$160,-344.65 as an actual revenue. Of this sum there had been collected during the 344.65 as an actual revenue. Of this sum there had been collected during the first stx months of this year more than \$155,000, and the minority had the word the city treasurer that collections for

the balance of the year would more an bring the amount up to the figures ibmitted in the resolutions. The next item objected to by the maubmitted ority was the flat water rates assessed prior to 1908, \$40,769,95. The special au-ditor's report had placed the sum at least \$50,000 higher. The minority

least \$50,000 higher. The minority showed that already this year \$38,000 of these rates had been collected, and they were assured by the treasurer that \$2,000 would easily be collected during the last six months of the year; so that the matter of \$40,769,96 was am-ply accounted for. Of the meter and miscellaneous wa-

ter rates, the minority found that for the first six months of this year over \$26,000 had been collected, and they were justified in multiplying the sum by two to get the results for the year, or \$52,896.94.

TOOK AUDITOR'S FIGURES.

For the departmental and miscel-laneous revenues, the minority took the figures of the auditor for the first five months of the year, \$46,201.35, aft-erwards adding the auditor's figures for June, \$\$,738,55, and multiplied the total by two, to make the total of \$109,878.80.

5109,879.80. The most serious objection to the mi-nority resolutions was in the matter of the amount of licenses for the year, \$225,000, this sum being considered far too high by the majority of the council. Stewart, chairman of the license com-mittee received a severe fall at the mittee, received a severe fall at the hands of Mr. Hall and had to admit that he was wrong entirely in his that he was wrong entirely in his premises. Mr. Hall showed that the that he was wrong entirely in his premises. Mr. Hall showed that the liquor licenses for January had sus-tained a loss by reason of the fact that many licenses had been paid in the lat-ter part of 1907 and overlapped into 1908. The resolutions had placed this loss at \$12,500, which was later found to be at least \$5,000 too low. For in-stance, there was collected for the first quarter of 1906; \$22,337.48, as against \$39,631.30 for the second quarter, and \$39,000 so far collected for the quarter beginning July 1. On July 30 the li-censes of all kinds collected amounted to \$106,538.41, and Mr. Hall contended that with two full quarters of liquor licenses coming in for the second half of the year, the full \$225,000 would be made up, and opposition did not dare dispute his assertion. The resolutions gave the amount of flat water rates for 1908 at \$132,000, and these were the estimates of the committee on waterworks, after all abatements had been taken into con-sideration. WAS BUTT OF RIDICULE.

Mr. Stewart criticized Mr. Hall for placing the assessed valuation of Salt Lake property at \$49,000,000, which had been estimated by the minority. When the assessor's figures were afterwards made known, it was found that the amount was \$60,000 less than \$49,000,-000 or making a difference of only or making a difference of only in taxes, Mr. Stewart was made butt of ridicule even by members the majority.

of the majority, Again the minority's figures of \$195,-723.64 for the city's portion of con-tracts made prior to 1908 were criti-cized. Mr. Hall showed that the nu-jority's figures were \$205,033.66, and in them were included \$10,750 for a crem-atory, the contract for which had hever been let, and also \$1,560.02 on the Jordan and Sait Lake canal, which sum is not to be paid until 1909. On this bond matter, you throw the two little index fingers or pointers at the top to the right, pull the string till you hear the bell-and you have done all you can to save Salt Lake, by beating the bond boodlers,
