

## BY TELEGRAPH.

**TERRA HAUTE.**—Evansville railroad machine shops have been burned. Loss \$20,000.

**PHILADELPHIA.**—A banquet was given this evening by the Philadelphia bar to Chief Justice Thompson on his retirement.

**NEW YORK.**—One of the most fashionable weddings of the season has come off to-day—Judson Jarvis, clerk of the bureau of arrests, to Miss Mamie Brennan, daughter of Sheriff Brennan.

Sophia Lyons, under sentence for shop lifting, escaped this evening from the State prison at Sing Sing in a carriage. Her husband, Ed. Lyons, escaped from the same place on the 10th inst.

**SPRINGFIELD, MASS.**—Charles A. J. Stearns, who killed Sandy Thomas at Holyoke, was arrested at Nashua this morning.

**NEW YORK.**—A heavy snow storm commenced at midnight and continues at this hour.

**SACRAMENTO, 19.**—Dr. M. G. Tyrrell was thrown from a buggy this a. m., and suffered very severe injuries.

**SONORA.**—George F. Wright, superintendent of the Excelsior mine, at Sugar Pine, was found dead this a. m., in his bed, at the mine. He probably died in an epileptic fit.

**LOS ANGELES.**—The depot grounds for the Southern Pacific railroad terminus, in this city, are relocated nearer the city, near the Eagle mills. The purchase money for fifteen acres—seven thousand five hundred dollars, has been subscribed by private citizens. The Common Council will take action in the matter to-night.

**ELKO, 19.**—W. B. Taylor, late editor of the *Elko Independent* and editor of the *Pioche Record*, has sold his interest in the *Record* to G. G. Berry, and goes to San Francisco to-morrow, to purchase material to start an evening paper, at Pioche, named the *Evening News*, which will probably commence issue Jan. 15th.

**LOS ANGELES, 22.**—The Arizona *Miner*, Prescott, Dec. 14th, says Gen. Crook's scouts are now in the field, from Dale Creek, Camp Whipple and Camp Verde. The Apaches at McDowell and Grant are all moving toward the country of the Yonto and Pinal. The Apaches are assisted by numbers of Pabutes and Apache Yuma Indians, who are useful as scouts and trailers. The *Miner* believes that the hostile Apaches will be forced to come to terms during the winter campaign. The scouts in the Upper Verde have found several abandoned rancheros destroyed, the plunder of which the Indians, in their hasty retreat, were obliged to leave behind them.

**MINERAL HILL, 22.**—A. L. Baker was shot last night, in this place, by Tom Kelly. Baker died this morning. Kelly was arrested.

**OTTAWA, 20.**—The *Citizen*, Government organ, in a review of the political situation, says it is obvious that the head of the Government may be called upon at any moment to reconstruct his cabinet; that Howe will be very soon made Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia Province, and his place will be filled by Mr. Archibald; that Langevin is the most capable of leading the French Canadian supporters of the Government instead of Sir George Cartier.

**MADRID, 20.**—A crisis in the Cabinet yesterday. Sitting of the Cortes suspended.

A dispatch from Liverpool says 449 persons, including passengers, are said to have perished by marine disasters the past 10 days. Thirty persons were lost by the sinking of the ship *Matchless* off Northumberland.

**PARIS, 21.**—Thiers and his family return from Versailles to-morrow and will stay here until the re-assembling of the National Assembly.

Before adjourning, this p. m., the Assembly passed a bill restoring to the Orleans princes their confiscated property.

The *Corsaire*, a radical journal, has been suspended for advocating socialism.

Thiers had a conference at Versailles, this p. m., with the committee on pardons, respecting the Communists sentenced to death, who are to be executed before the end of the year, unless commuted.

**LONDON, 21.**—The river Thames, which has already overflowed its banks in many places, suddenly rose nearly a foot to-day at Windsor. The Home Park is one vast lake of water. Thousands of acres of other land are submerged. The present inundation by the Thames is the greatest since the flood of 1862.

**SAN FRANCISCO, 23.**—The weather reports from Los Angeles, Santa Barbara, San Buenaventura, San Jose, San Diego and other parts show from half to three fourths of an inch of rain in the last 24 hours, and the prospects are favorable for a continuance.

**PORTLAND, Or. 23.**—There was a disastrous fire in this city to-day, originating in a china wash house, on the east side of Front street, between Alden and Morrison streets. The entire block north, between Alden and Washington streets, and nearly the entire block on the west side of Front street, between Alden and Harrison were burned. Careless building was entirely destroyed. Gelman's and the Occidental blocks were partially destroyed. At 2 p. m. a general conflagration seemed imminent, but the wind changed, driving the flames back upon the burnt district. Engines and firemen came from Vancouver, Oregon City, Salem and Albany. The loss is reasonably estimated at \$350; insurance, \$150,000. Several firemen were injured by the falling of Carter's building, Gallagher, foreman of No. 4, probably fatally.

**PARIS, 23.**—President Thiers will go to Calais this week to witness artillery experiments.

**ST. PETERSBURG.**—The *Russian World* newspaper, says the British ambassador at St. Petersburg, has notified Prince Gortshakoff that if the Russian troops penetrate countries between Khiva and Afghanistan, England will be compelled to intervene in support of Afghan independence.

**PARIS, 23.**—A dispatch from Bordeaux says the Liverpool packet *Germania* went ashore on Saturday evening, during a violent storm, on a sand bank in the mouth of the river Gironde. The water soon began to break over the vessel, and the passengers and crew were compelled to take to the rigging, from which thirty passengers were washed away and drowned. The remainder left on the rigging, after passing the entire night in their perilous position, were rescued on Sunday morning by a French steamer.

**ST. PETERSBURG, 22.**—The Khan of Khiva has summoned the auxiliary tribes to assist him against Russia.

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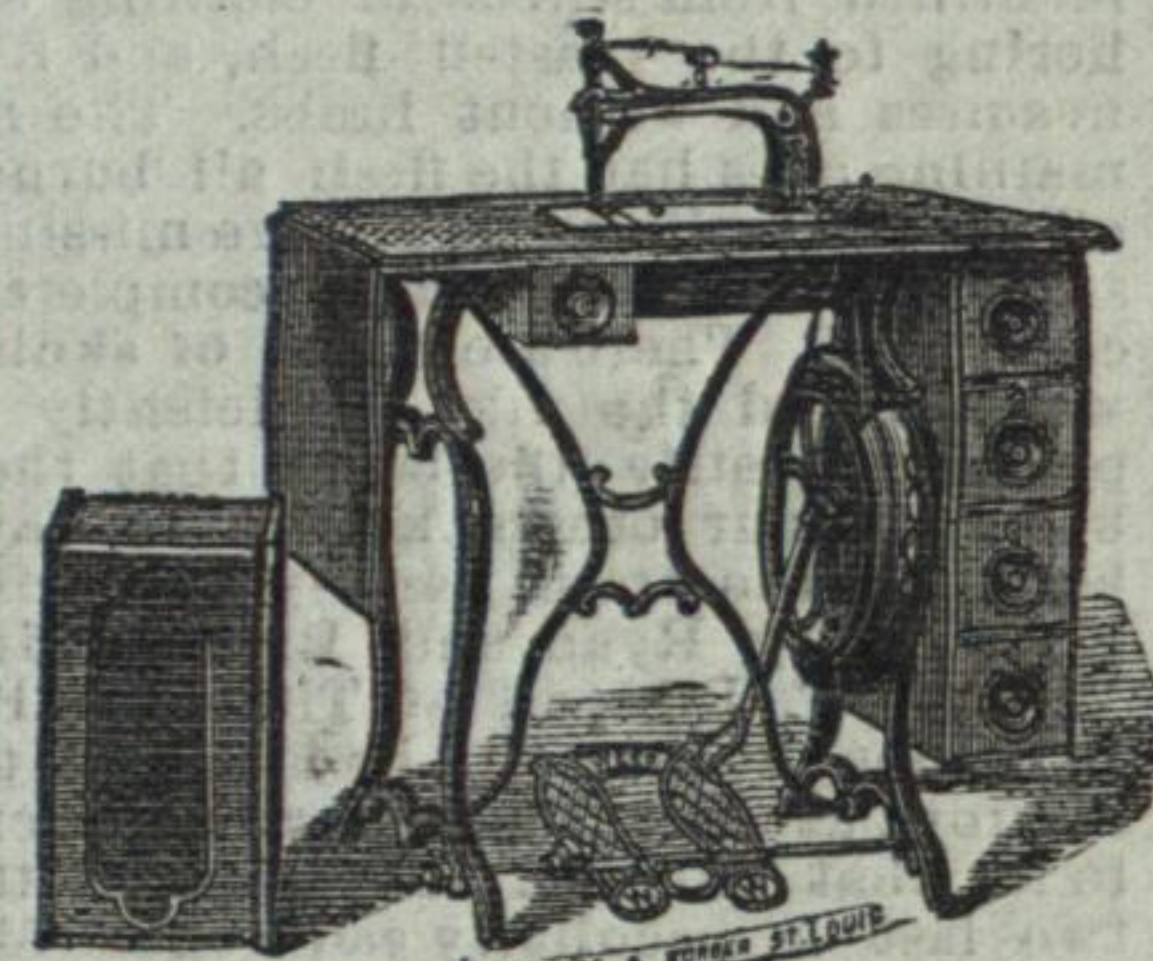
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
