## NOTABLE UTAH WOMEN.

The hues of royal purples and endless arrays of emblematic elk heads have held the city in dazzling spell during the past week, the big parade on Wednesday night and the great outdoor ball on Thursday making all other events of the week seem somewhat dimly in comparison.

An intermittent flow of quiet home affairs in the way of card parties, receptions and teas have made ripples on the placid surface of the social tide, and the marriage of Miss Keith and Lieut. Allen, a pretty and wide-spread eddy in the same.

The wedding of Miss Lillian Keith and Lieut. Albert C. Allen, which took place on Wednesday evening was one of the most elaborate events of the year. The handsome Keith residence on east South Temple, where the affair took place, was magnificently decorated, the arrangement being designed by Mrs. Samuel Woodward. The drawing room in which the ceremony was performed, was decorated in red, white and blue, the bride party standing under a canopy of satin ribbons in the three colors, and flowers in red, white and blue being arranged on all sides. The most striking feature of the decorations was a large electric fan, arranged with rows of colored glass, which were flashed into light alternately, producing the effect of waving folds. Palms and plants were banked beneath it as a back ground for the alcove, and a fringe of vines ran around the walls. Ferns and smilax festooned the curtains and the mantel was dressed with palms and American Beauty roses.

Yellow was the color chosen for the library, marigolds and nasturtiums being the flowers used, and palms and plants filling available corners and niches.

In the hall red prevailed, carnations gleaming from mantels and piano, while around the balcony were festooned ropes of smilax, with palms and plants forming a bower in which the orchestra was ensconced.

The dining room was done in pink and green, pink sweet peas, candles and ribbons being used with artistic effect. A cloth of white Mexican drawn work was spread over pink satin, and in the center a large oval mirror rested, with a square of Duchesse lace covered with sweet peas making a beautiful centerpiece. At 7 o'clock the party entered the drawing room to the strains of Mendelssohn's wedding march, Miss Mary Woodward, the flower girl, and David Keith, Jr., leading, followed by the maid of honor, Miss Etta Keith, and then the bride on the arm of her father. They were met under the canopy by the groom, and his best man, Mr. Sam Porter, and Bishop Scanlan read the marriage service. The bride wore an exquisite gown of white liberty bell in train with flounces and bodice of white Duchesse lace. Her veil was of tulle, and was fastened with a sunburst of diamonds. Her flowers were a shower bouquet of bride roses. The bridesmaid was gowned in pink organdy over tulle of the same color, and carried pink roses. Mrs. Keith wore heliotrope crepe with yoke of Duchesse lace. During the ceremony the orchestra played "Cavalier Rustic," which was changed to "Star Spangled Banner" at the close of the ceremony.

MISS ADA FAUST.

Miss Ada Faust, the subject of this sketch, was born in Salt Lake City, and during her majority has been prominently connected with the schools of the State. Her life was uneventful until she was seventeen, when the death of her mother threw the cares of a household upon her shoulders, the trial demonstrating in her exceptional qualities of reliance and ability. Under these added cares she still pursued her studies at the University, and also the study of music, for which she has a decided talent. After graduating at the University with high honors, she took up teaching as a profession, working in the schools of Utah for several years and afterward going to San Francisco to apply herself to the study of music. For two years, she studied under Miss Lange, a graduate of the Leipzig Conservatory, and afterward returned to Utah, where she has since been connected in a professional capacity with the public schools of the State. Miss Faust enjoys the distinction of being the first lady member of the Mathematical Society of Utah, having an especial gift in this line. Her abilities are not confined to the purely intellectual, but take in the aesthetic and artistic as well, her lace work and embroidery having taken prizes at both the Utah and California State fairs. She has been always interested in politics and an ardent worker for women's suffrage, being one of the first members of the Woman's Suffrage Society organized in the Fourteenth ward. She served as president of the Democratic Society of Farmers ward for some time, and served on the Democratic campaign committee in the year of Utah's admission to the Union. Miss Faust's predilections, however, are chiefly pedagogical, and she has spent the past summer in studying the science of teaching under Colonel Parker in Chicago, and while there she had the honor of being admitted to his Round Table for superintendents and professors. Miss Faust has been mentioned as a possible Democratic nominee for the State superintendency of public schools in the election to be held for that office in September.
