Cordoba, Mex., Dec. 28 .- Jose Santos Zelaya declared tonight that he is still president of Nicaragua, although he may never go back to that country to enjoy privileges of the office. Madriz he asserted, is only a provisional presi-dent, and that he (Zelaya) has not reinquished the office

In a statement made to an Associated Press representative on the train in which he is traveling to Mexico City, Zelaya said he was still the head of the raguan government. He was leav-Nicaraguan government. He was leav-ing his country for an indefinite period in the hope that affairs would quiet fown. In support of his declaration he exhibited papers, attached to which were government seals and ribbons. These papers, he said, contained the proof of the truth of his statement. In further support of his claim it

In further support of his claim it was pointed out by members of his party that the Guerrero floated the Nicaraguan liag at her masthead, in addition to the Mexican flag. The reports concerning his wealth. Zelaya said, are grossly exargerated. His fortune is not more than 42,000,000, gold, and is invested mostly in Nica-raguan government bonds. He claimed to nave advanced the 550,000 paid on the Emery claim as a personal loan out of his own funds, there having been no money in the government treasury. This amount, he said, had never been refunded. He strongly denied that he had wrongly obtained any part of his fortune through concessions of which be had the disposal. He declared a vote of thanks had been tendered him officially before he left home for serv-fees rendered to his country.

AMERICAN SURGEONS SAVED MANY LIVES

SAVED MANY LIVES Bluefields, Dec. 28.—Searching parties have been working in the bush for sev-eral days burning bodies. In the recent fight near Rama, Gen. Estrada's guard of honor, consisting of 100 of the best blood in Bluefields, was almost wiped out of existence. American surgeons who took care of the wounded, labored for 70 hours with scarcely a rest, their skill and the ra-pidity with which they performed the operations saving many lives. Former Gov. Lopez, a second cousin of ex-President Zelaya, has been released from jail on his promise to join Estra-da.

from jall on his promise to Join Estra-da. Hundreds of prisoners who have ar-rived from Rama tell pitful tales of the privation to which their emaclated forms and swollen feet testify. Ze-laya had promised to send a pack train to them weekly with supplies, but none ever came. For 15 days rations of the men consisted of bananas only, and for five days they were entirely with-out food. Many could scarcely hold their rifes on account of their swollen hands, while their shoeless feet made marching an agon. Many prisoners said that they did not know why they were fighting, but vagely feared that some catastrophe was about to happen. When they learn-ed the true situateion they cheered for Estrada. ZELAYA DENIES HE'S A PRISONER OF MEXICANS

Coordoba, Mexico, Dec. 28-Jose San-tos Zelaya denied today that he was a





prisoner in the hands of Mexican of-flicials in any sense of the word. The was asked whether it was a fact as reported in a dispstch from Man-agua, that in giving him a refuge in this country, the Mexican government accepted responsibility for his person, and in doing so looked upon him as a prisoner. He stated emphatically that was free to go where he choose. Zelaya denied that he favored friend-ly intervention on the part of the Mex-ton and United States government to the end that a consolication of all the Central American republies might be brought about. He said he believed Seey Knox was now realizing the in-justice of his attitude toward him and declared he never understood why the secretary should have molested him. He might go to Belgium to live, he said. In any event, he would not re-turn to Nicaragua until peace is re-stored. It was his opinion that the war would end within two months, but would not venture an opinion as to which side would be successful.

CADMIUM PRODUCED

ITALIAN MURDERER

IN UNITED STATES

Washington, Dec. 29.—There is a new American industry. It is the pro-duction of a metal which possesses re-markable properties. Until recently cadmium used in this country was im-ported from Silesia, but now we are producing so much of it at home that we import very little of it. Cadmium melts at a lower tempera-ture, and, like bismuth lowers the melting point of alloys in which it is used. Bismuth, however, forms brittle alloys, but many alloys of cadmium are ductile and maileable, yet hard. The melting points of these alloys are lower than the melting points of any of the metals composing them. Sev-eral of them liquify at temperature considerably below that of boiling water and a silvery-looking "Trick" teapoon made of one of these com-pounds, metals in a cup of tea, to the great astonishment of the tea drinker. The chife source of cadmium is zinc.

WIRELESS EXPERIMENTS.

Between Japan and Hawaii Not Very Successful. Scoul, Wednesday, Dec. 20.—The plans for next year's educational work in Ko-rea include the establishment of 30 in-dustrial schools, a big step in advance of anything hitherto attempted. Thirty additional common schools will also be established. The students of the Presbyterian mis-sionary school, attended by a very large number of Koreans, went 'on strike re-cently and the entire student body walk-ed out because of the refusal of the authorities of the school to dismiss a Korean teacher, who, it was alleged, had maltreated one of the students. BRITISH NAVY'S WIRELESS PLANS STOLEN

London, Dec. 28.—The wholesale theft of wireless plans, models and sketches, which in the hands of an expert would reveal all the workings and innermost secrets of the wireless service of the British navy, is charged against Rich-ard Knowlen, who was placed on trial at Portsmouth today. Knowlen is a draftsman attached to the torpedo school ship Vernon. In his room were found no less than 80 plans for wireless improvements and coding books of the most confidential character, which are issued to officers only.

The authorities attach the greatest importance to the arrest, as they con-tend that if the documents abstracted from the Vernon had reached foreign governments all the lab.r of recent years given to the perfecting of a wire-less system for the British navy would have been rendered practically fruitless.

MORE PAY FOR MOTORMEN.

MORE PAY FOR MOTORMEN. New York, Dec. 23.—Forty-five hundred motormen and conductors, employed on the street car lines controlled by the Public Service corporation of New Jer-suy, are to receive an increase in salary of a cent an hour, according to an official builtetin issued by the company today. At present the motormen receive 20 cents an hour in their first year on serv-lec and up to 23 cents for men in the service 10 years or more. The salarites of all are to be increased in the ratio of one cent, beginning on Saturday next, and similar increases are to be allowed at the beginning of each year thereafter.

TURKISH CABINET RESIGNS.

TOTATISH CABINET RESIGNS, Constantinople, Dec. 28.—The whole Turkish cabinet resigned tonight, follow-ing the resignation of Hilmi Pasha, grand vizier, who withdrew from the ministry early in the day. It is report-ed that serious conflicts have occurred at Bagdad, but this is not confirmed officially. The immediate cause of Pasha's resignation is not known, but recently attempts have been made in the chamber to overturn the ministry. It is believed that the committee of
