

# ZELAYA CLAIMS HE IS PRESIDENT

Madriz Is Only a Provisional One And He Himself Has Not Relinquished Office.

## HIS WEALTH EXAGGERATED.

Does Not Exceed Two Million Dollars, Gold—American Surgeons Saved Many Lives at Rama.

Cordoba, Mex., Dec. 28.—Jose Santos Zelaya declared tonight that he is still president of Nicaragua, although he may never go back to that country to enjoy privileges of the office. Madriz, he asserted, is only a provisional president, and that he (Zelaya) has not relinquished the office.

In a statement made to an Associated Press representative on the train in which he is traveling to Mexico City, Zelaya said he was still the head of the Nicaraguan government. He was leaving his country for an indefinite period in the hope that affairs would quiet down. In support of his declaration he exhibited papers, attested to which were government seals and ribbons. These papers, he said, contained the proof of the truth of his statement.

In further support of his claim it was pointed out by members of his party that the Guerrero flag, the Nicaraguan flag at her masthead, in addition to the Mexican flag.

The reports concerning his wealth, Zelaya said, are grossly exaggerated. His fortune is not more than \$2,000,000, gold, and is invested mostly in Nicaraguan government bonds. He claimed to have advanced the \$50,000 paid on the Emery claim as a personal loan out of his own funds, there having been no money in the government treasury.

This amount, he said, had never been refunded. He strongly denied that he had wrongly obtained any part of his fortune through concessions of which he had the disposal. He declared a vote of thanks had been tendered him officially before he left home for services rendered to his country.

### AMERICAN SURGEONS SAVED MANY LIVES

Bluefields, Dec. 28.—Searching parties have been working in the bush for several days burning bodies. In the recent fight near Rama, Gen. Estrada's guard of honor, consisting of 100 of the best blood in Bluefields, was almost wiped out of existence.

American surgeons who took care of the wounded, labored for 70 hours with scarcely a rest, their skill and the rapidity with which they performed the operations saving many lives. Former Gov. Lopez, a second cousin of ex-President Zelaya, had been released from jail on his promise to join Estrada.

Hundreds of prisoners who have arrived from Rama, told pitiful tales of the privation to which their emaciated forms and swollen feet testify. Zelaya had promised to send a pack train to them weekly with supplies, but none ever came. For 15 days rations of the men consisted of bananas only, and for five days they were entirely without food. Many could scarcely hold their rifles on account of their swollen hands, while their shoeless feet made marching an agony.

Many prisoners said that they did not know why they were fighting, but vaguely feared that some catastrophe was about to happen. When they learned the true situation they cheered for Estrada.

Revolutionary leaders gave the men clothing to replace their tatters and fed them as best they could. No guard is necessary for the former Zelayan troops say they will fight for Estrada when he goes to Managua.

### ZELAYA DENIES HE'S A PRISONER OF MEXICANS

prisoner in the hands of Mexican officials in any sense of the word.

He was asked whether it was a fact as reported in a dispatch from Managua, that in giving him a refuge in this country, the Mexican government accepted responsibility for his person, and in doing so looked upon him as a prisoner. He stated emphatically that such was not the case and that he was free to go where he chose.

Zelaya denied that he favored friendly intervention on the part of the Mexican and United States government to the end that a consolidation of all the Central American republics might be brought about. He said he believed Secy. Knox was now realizing the injustice of his attitude toward him and declared he never understood why the secretary should have molested him.

He might go to Belgium to live, he said. In any event, he would not return to Nicaragua until peace is restored. It was his opinion that the war would end within two months, but he would not venture an opinion as to which side would be successful.

### CADMIUM PRODUCED IN UNITED STATES

Washington, Dec. 29.—There is a new American industry. It is the production of a metal which possesses remarkable properties. Until recently cadmium used in this country was imported from Silesia, but now we are producing a cadmium which is as good as the imported metal.

Cadmium melts at a lower temperature, and like bismuth lowers the melting point of alloys in which it is used. Bismuth, however, forms brittle alloys, but many alloys of cadmium are ductile and malleable, yet hard. The melting points of these alloys are lower than the melting points of any of the metals composing them. Several of them float at temperature considerably below that of boiling water, and a silver-looking "trick" teaspoon made of one of these compounds, melts in a cup of tea, to the great astonishment of the tea drinker.

The chief source of cadmium is zinc ore, though small quantities of this comparatively rare metal are contained in some lead ores.

### ITALIAN MURDERER WILL BE DEPORTED

San Jose, Cal., Dec. 28.—Nateo Casalegno, an Italian arrested in this city on a charge of burglary, will start for New York Sunday to be deported to Italy, according to a message received from the bureau of immigration at Washington by the local chief of police.

On looking up Casalegno's record officers found that he had served part of a long term in Italy for the murder of his sweetheart and had come to this country after securing his papers. His residence here was declared illegal.

### EDUCATIONAL WORK IN KOREA.

Seoul, Wednesday, Dec. 20.—The plans for next year's educational work in Korea include the establishment of 20 industrial schools, a big step in advance of anything hitherto attempted. Thirty additional common schools will also be established.

The students of the Presbyterian missionary school, attended by a very large number of Koreans, went on strike recently and the school was closed out because of the refusal of the authorities of the school to dismiss a Korean teacher who was charged with having maltreated one of the students. The police were called in by the principal, Dr. Gale. Matters have now been satisfactorily arranged.

### BRITISH NAVY'S WIRELESS PLANS STOLEN

London, Dec. 28.—The wholesale theft of wireless plans, models and sketches, which in the hands of an enemy would reveal all the workings and innermost secrets of the wireless service of the British navy, is charged against Richard Knowlton, who was placed on trial at Portsmouth today.

Knowlton is a draftsman attached to the torpedo school ship Vernon. In his room were found no less than 30 plans for wireless improvements, including books of the most confidential coding code, which are issued to officers only.

The authorities attach the greatest importance to the arrest, and they contend that if the documents abstracted from the Vernon had reached foreign governments all the labor of recent years given to the perfecting of a wireless system for the British navy would have been rendered practically fruitless.

### MORE PAY FOR MOTORMEN.

New York, Dec. 28.—Forty-five hundred motormen and conductors, employed on the street car lines controlled by the Public Service corporation of New Jersey, are to receive an increase in salary of one cent an hour, according to an official bulletin issued by the company today.

At present the motormen receive 29 cents an hour in their first year on service and up to 25 cents for men in the service 10 years or more.

The salaries of all are to be increased in the ratio of one cent, beginning on Saturday next, and similar increases are to be allowed at the beginning of each year thereafter.

### TURKISH CABINET RESIGNS.

Constantinople, Dec. 28.—The whole Turkish cabinet resigned tonight following the resignation of Hilmi Pasha, grand vizier, who withdrew from the ministry early in the day. It is reported that serious conflicts have occurred at Bagdad, but this is not confirmed officially. The immediate cause of Pasha's resignation is not known, but recently a serious conflict has been made in the chamber to overturn the ministry. It is believed that the committee of

union and progress decided upon a change in the ministry because they regard the accusations against the former grand vizier, Kiamli Pasha, unjust. It is understood the committee favors the appointment of Teyfik Pasha, present ambassador at London, as grand vizier, but it is not likely that Kiamli Pasha will return to power.

### OKLAHOMA WOMAN SUFFRAGIST CAMPAIGN

Guthrie, Okla., Dec. 29.—The woman suffragists of Oklahoma are waging an unceasing campaign to secure a constitutional amendment giving them the right to vote.

Petitions are being circulated throughout the state asking an initiative election, and 37,000 signatures already have been secured. Chairman Harris of the Republican state committee, signed such a petition yesterday, stating he would like to see the women get a vote on the subject.

### SHOWER BATHS FOR MINE MULES

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Dec. 29.—A shower bath for the mules working in the Henry colliery is a coal mining novelty recently installed by the Lehigh Valley Coal company. The mules take a bath at the close of each day's work and enjoy it so much that it is hard work to drive them from the shower to their stalls.

### WIRELESS EXPERIMENTS.

Between Japan and Hawaii Not Very Successful.

Tokio, Monday, Dec. 6.—Experiments with wireless telegraphy between Japan and Hawaii, and on to San Francisco, have been going on for some time, but with no very marked success. The effort was made to reach San Francisco direct. It is known that telegrams have been received at Honolulu points from Hawaii, but these were not sufficiently frequent or connected to make the establishment of a permanent station advisable. The experiment will, however, continue for some time. The authorities express the belief that eventually, permanent communication with Hawaii will be established.

### TYPHOID IN MONTREAL.

Ottawa, Ont., Dec. 29.—An alarming situation confronts the city of Montreal, which has been fighting an epidemic of typhoid fever since September. The epidemic is becoming worse and the hospitals crowded. Patients being refused admission at many of them.

A contaminated city water supply is blamed for the outbreak of the disease. Nearly 700 cases have been treated since September in hospitals and complete records show more than 1,000 cases. It is believed as many more cases have not been reported.

### UNITED STATES FARM LANDS INVESTMENT

Chicago, Dec. 29.—The United States has \$30,000,000,000 invested in farm lands, their buildings, machinery and live stock, according to a census taken by Orange Judd Farmer. From 1,000,000 in 1850, the number of farms has increased to nearly 7,000,000 in 1900. The report adds:

"No such increase in agricultural land values was ever known before in the history of the world in any country. The value of farms in the United States has increased 44 per cent more than in 1900, the figures of that year showing an increase of 25 per cent over the previous decade."

The most remarkable figures presented show that the western section, which includes New Mexico, Colorado, Wyoming, Montana and other states, has, in the past 10 years, shown an increase in the number of farms of 100 per cent. At the same time the value has increased 98 per cent, and the products 21 per cent.

Value of farms in the south central states has increased 58 per cent, and in the north central states 43 per cent. In the north Atlantic states there has been an increase in value of 13 per cent and in the south Atlantic states an increase of 34 per cent.
