Organization Effectuated—County
Board of Education Named.

EXPLOSION OF GIANT CAPS.

Causes Serious Injury to J. W. Aikens
—Municipal Court Cases—Divorce
Suit—Wedding—News Notes.

Ogden, July 4.—The following report to the board of county commissioners at its meeting yesterday afternoon, and on motion of Chairman Stanford was passed by the board, each proposition thereof being voted upon separately:

On behalf of the committee appointed to submit a report for the consolidation of the school districts in Weber county and provide in said report for the manner of procedure in carrying into effect the provisions of chapter 10, laws of Utah, 1905, relating to school districts of the first class, approved March 9, 1905, I beg to submit the following:

Whereas Weber county outside of the corporate limits of Ogden City has a total population of more than 3,000 pupils from 6 to 18 years of age, to-wit, 2,575 children, as appears from the last enumeration reported to the office of the Weber county superintendent of schools, and

Whereas, by virtue of said school population as aforesaid Weber county outside of the corporate limits of Ogden City comes under the provisions of the law passed by the last Legislature and approved by the governor on March 9, 1905.

Therefore I move that the now existing school districts in Weber county, to-wit, School district No. 1, embracing the school population in the settlements of Hooper, Roy, Kanesville, Taylor, Wilson and Garland; school district No. 2, embracing the school population in the settlements of Plain City, Poplar, Farr-West and Warren; school districts of North Ogden, Pleasant View, Harrisville, Roy, Farr-West, Weber, Marriot, Riverdale, Burch Creek and Uintah be known as school representative precinct No. 3; that the precincts of Plain City, Farr-West, Warren, Staterville and Perry be known as school representative precinct No. 4; and that the precincts of Eden, Harrisville and Liberty be known as school representative precinct No. 5.

And whereas, Said Weber county school districts, by law constituted a county high district of the first class, and the public school system required to be under the control of a board of education consisting of five members, one from each of five representative precincts within said district;

And whereas, It is the duty of the county commissioners of Weber county to appoint the members of said board of education for said Weber county school district, there being no trustee designated for said district;

Therefore be it resolved by the board of county commissioners of Weber county that F. H. Haylock, Sr., be appointed member of the board of education in and for school precinct No. 1; that Antene Christensen be appointed member of the board of education in and for school precinct No. 2; that F. W. Stratford be appointed member of

the board of education in and for school precinct No. 3; that E. C. Garver be appointed member of the board of education in and for school precinct No. 4; that John Hails be appointed member of the board of education in and for school precinct No. 5, each being a resident, qualified registered voter in the school representative precinct from which he is designated, said five members of the said board of education to constitute the board of education of said Weber county school district until the first regular meeting of the board of education in January, 1906, and until their successors have been duly elected and have qualified. The official bond of each of said members of the board of education is hereby fixed at five hundred (\$500) dollars and the salary of each member of said board of education of Weber county school district is hereby fixed at one hundred (\$100) dollars per annum.
