E. H. HABRIMAN **ON PANIC OF 1907** Analyzes Conditions That Made It Possible and Gives Reason Why No Danger of Return. BUSINESS ON SOUND BASIS. Next Panic Will be More Serious Because it Will be Due to Shrink-New York, May 31 .- On the eve of his departure for Europe to visit Paris

Harriman. "All that is needed is a realization on the part of the farmers of the preparations for prosperity which have been so liberally made. There are now more acres under cultivation than over before in the history of the country and correspondingly large crops, I look for happy times. There will be a big burst of specula-tion and a rise in the price of every-thing; but these will quickly grade down from the top to whatever level the crops will make logical. I shall look to see the improvement in con-ditions go on.

"The time is ripe, however, for a "The time is ripe, nowever, for a warning as to the proper employment of idle money. We should be careful that this money be not devoted to the development of fake projects, but, on the contrary, used in the upbuilding of real undertakings resting upon solid **go**undations.

BLAMES LANDIS DECISION.

"There was no necessity for the 1907 panic. That panic was directly caused by the extraordinary decision and the general attitude prevailing at the time general attitude prevailing at the time against the railroads and corporations generally. There is no mistake about this. I know what I am talking about, because I went through it all. It was a panic of sentiment—a disaster caus-ed by the fear of something that did not happen. It frightened people into withdrawing their money from circul-ation.

"The next panic will be something The next panic will be something more serious, because it will be due to shrinkage of business. As far as the mental attitude of the public is concerned, we are on a saner basis to-day than we were in 1907. If we keep going up, however, and come down, it will hurt more after we have gone up three or four stories."

Mr. Harriman spoke haltingly, often stopping as if groping for words to match his thoughts. Again and again he reverted to the subject of crops, laying strong emphasis on the point that the lasting prosperity of the coun-try depended upon that, and that only.

try depended upon that, and that only. A question as to the ultimate change of Congress as regards to the tariff, he dismissed with a shrug, saying: 'I don't think that the tariff legis-lation will be of much importance." The working agreement recently en-tered into by the Union Pacific, the Great Northern and the Northern Pa-cific, by the terms of which all will use the same tracks from Tacoma to Vancouver, was cited by Mr. Harriman as an example of what might be done to save unnecessary investment of capital. capital.
