Keenan of Pittsburg, who is president of the Residents and Property Owners' association, said that the condition of affairs on the isl-and was bad, that United States Minister Squiers had virtually advised a delegation of Pine islanders, who recently called on him in Havana, to take matters into their own hands and es-

tablish a provisional government. Con-tinuing, Mr. Keenan said: "The Isle of Pines is on the verge of anarchy, having no government, no courts or magistrates, no schools and no revenue. All taxes and custom duties paid by the islanders go into the Cuban treasury, and not a cent is ex-pended for their benefit. All property and other records are kept in Cuba and transfers of real estate are rendered well-nigh impossible by the enormous fee demanded by Cuban officials. All elections have been suspended and American citizens own nearly one-half of the island and are a majority of the taxpaying population."

RECIPROCITY WITH CUBA.

The Main Issue is Over Duty on Sugar.

Washington, Nov. 10 .- While the Cuban reciprocity treaty remains in Ha-vana President Palma has supplied to Senor Quesada, the Cuban minister here, full instructions as to the repre-sentations to be made to the United States government respecting it, and these have already been made known to Secy. Hay. It is gathered that the main issue between the negotiators is the rate of rebate to be allowed upon Cuban sugar and tobacco entering the United States, and, as indicated last week, it is probable that there will be a compromise between the 25 per cent which the United States government is

willing to allow and the 50 per cent which the Cubans demand.

Norfolk, Va., Nov. 10.-J. A. Cahoon, motorman on the Norfolk & Atlantic Terminal company, fatally shot Capt. Winfield Tucker of the Merritt & Chapman Wrecking company. Tucker was drawing a pistol to shoot Cahoon, on account of domestic troubles, when Ca-hoon fired from the piatform of his car. Cahoon was arrested.

Washington, Nov. 10.-Government control of all wireless telegraph stations along the ccast of the United States is recommended by Rear-Admiral R. B. Bradford, chief of the bureau of equipment, in his an-nual report, in the concluding portion, which was issued today. Foreign govwhich was issued today Foreign gov ernments, it is pointed out, are exer-cising careful supervision over the location of wireless stations within their waters, thus insuring prompt transmis. sion of messages at all times. Admira Bradford says it is proposed to establish wireless telegraph stations for the purpose of instructing officers and men at Newport, New York, San Francisco and probably other naval stations. In order to ascertain the effect of heat

which is said to be injurious to the successful working of wireless apparatus, a station will be established at Key West, Fla.

Key West, Fla. Although other naval powers are far in advance of the United States in the installation of wireless telegraph ap-pliances on board naval ships, Rear-Admiral Bradford does not think any ground has been lost by the United States in pursuing a conservative pol-icy in the adoption of some particular system for use in the navy. In regard to the construction of the transpacific cable. Rear-Admira Bradford reports that so far as he is aware the Commercial Pacific cable company has signified no intention of

ollowing the government requirement for building a cable as specied by the president. The report says that al-though the officers of the company appeared anxious before the adjournment of Congress to obtain the Pacific cable surveys made by the department, no application has been made at the department for this information.

The report says that no statement has been given out concerning the route the company intends to follow, nor have steps been taken to prepare relay stations in American territory considered necessary by the depart ment, with the exception of acquiring the site for landing the cable near Honolulu

French Industrial School for Chicago

Chicago, Nov. 11 .- According to Henri Merou, the French consul here, who has just returned from a trip to France, the Franco-American committee which had under consideration the establishment of a great French industrial school in the United States, has definitely decided upon Chicago as the most advantageous location for such most advantageous location for such an institution. M. Merou said he had been informed of the decision of the committee at a dinner given to him in Paris last month by Jules Siegfried, the former minister of commerce, at the French capital and a present deputy who has been, since the plan was first proposed, one of the chief workers in its favor.
