

THE SUMNER'S STORMY TRIP.

On Way From Philippines Transport Had a Perilous Voyage.

GEN. CHAFFEE A PASSENGER

Says Greatest Difficulty in Philippines Now is Overcoming the Legends and Superstitions of People.

San Francisco, Nov. 10.—The United States transport Sumner arrived in port this evening from the Philippines, after a most stormy and most perilous voyage. Shortly after leaving Yokohama the vessel encountered one of those terrific storms peculiar to Asiatic waters—the typhoon. Boats were smashed, portions of her rigging carried away, and during the height of the storm a launch was torn from its fastenings and struck Mrs. Chaffee's stateroom with terrific force. The shock greatly prostrated that lady, who was ill when she boarded the vessel. For hours the staunch vessel was in the gale, but careful seamanship kept the vessel in safety until the storm broke and the weather calmed down to permit her being made shipshape.

On board the transport were Gen. Adna R. Chaffee and wife, Vice-Gov. Wright of the Philippine commission, accompanied by Mrs. Wright; Gen. Chaffee's staff, Capt. J. R. Lindsay, Lieut. Roy B. Harper, Maj. J. L. Phillips, Maj. William H. Arthur, Judge John H. Blount of the Philippine insular government, Lieut.-Col. James T. Kerr and wife and a large number of officers' wives returning home.

Gen. Chaffee has been absent from this country for over three years during which time duty called him to Cuba, China and to the Philippines. His services in China were such that he was recognized the world over as a tactician of wonderful knowledge and force and a diplomat of unusual ability. To Gen. Chaffee's efforts were due the speedy and peaceful settlement of the Chinese difficulty and the recognition of his services in China he was detailed to go to the Philippines to bring about a more harmonious condition of affairs. The general said a representative of the Associated Press:

"When I left Manila everything was progressing in a most satisfactory manner. I could not be more pleased with the situation. Civilization has accomplished wonders and the natives are fast recognizing the institutions of this government and meeting them with a more friendly spirit. Of course, some of the provinces are not yet expected to meet with further trouble, but the outlook is most cheerful and, beyond occasional skirmishes here and there, I look for no great difficulties or disturbances requiring unusual force to subdue. Peaceful methods are making themselves felt among the native leaders, who are in many instances assisting our government by advising their former belligerent followers to lay down their arms. Some of the former fighting leaders, of whom there are a few, have become peaceful."

"The greatest difficulty we experience in the islands is overcoming the legends and superstitions of the people. It is hard to overcome at once traits which have been born in the natives for centuries, and I will say that to this one feature is largely due the spread of cholera and other pestilential diseases among them. They cannot be made to submit to or to understand the modern methods of treatment, nor can they be made the use of an up-to-date sanitary system. They will not submit to quarantine peacefully, and frequently escape from their bounds, spreading the disease. In the city of Manila a very good system prevails and in consequence the health conditions are better there than they ever have been in the history of the city."

"Great hardship prevails in some of the provinces where the natives refuse to plant their rice crops on account of the loss of their farm animals, and I look for much suffering in those provinces; but the government has already taken steps to relieve the situation and it will not be long before most of the needy will be looked after."

"I am very much pleased with the situation in the province of Samar. That was once one of the most unruly and belligerent of the provinces is now as quiet and peaceful as this big city of yours. The natives are becoming prosperous under the industry which has been fostered there, and they have a ready market for their rice and hemp."

Gen. Chaffee reported Mrs. Chaffee's health greatly improved and stated that she had almost fully recovered from the prostration following her awful experiences during the typhoon.

Gen. Chaffee and party were waited upon this evening by William H. Harper, representing the Union League club of Chicago and formally invited by that gentleman to be guests of the club during their stay in Chicago. Mr. Harper acted as host for the Grand Army hall and Memorial association of Illinois, tendered the general the invitation to be the guest of the association at a public reception given in his honor.

Gen. Chaffee expressed great pleasure at being invited to become the guest of the Chicagoans and said: "Mr. Harper, I place myself in your hands. Any arrangements you make will be pleasant to me." Similar invitations were extended to Gov. Wright and accepted conditionally, the governor not being certain as to his itinerary.

Mr. Harper has arranged for Gen. Chaffee and party to go to Chicago over the Southern Pacific, the Union Pacific and the Chicago & Northwestern roads. The party will leave here at 6 o'clock on Thursday evening in the special car of Vice-President McCulloch of the Chicago & Northwestern road. During his stay here Gen. Chaffee will be banqueted by the Military association and by the Loyal Legion.

Stratton Will Case. Colorado Springs, Colo., Nov. 10.—When the Stratton will case was called up in the county court today another postponement was taken. The time until tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock. It is expected that at that time the attorneys for Mr. Harry Stratton will move for a continuance until the January term of court and that the administrators to collect and other parties in interest will not oppose the granting of the motion.

For the first time in the history of the case, Atty.-Gen. Post of Colorado appeared today in the interest of the state, his connection being first to look after the inheritance tax, which the state will get, and secondly, to look after the state's interest in the will. The will is broken, in which event the entire fortune will revert to Colorado, according to the wishes of the dead millionaire.

Packing Plant Goes Up. Cheyenne, Wyo., Nov. 10.—The Hammond Packing company of this city will rebuild its plant here and will spend \$50,000 in improvements. Employment will be given to 250 men and the plant will have a capacity of 1,000 hogs and 500 to 600 cattle per day.

Price of Pies Goes Up. San Francisco, Nov. 10.—The organized bakers of this city have raised the price of certain kinds of bread, pies and cakes. Hereafter many of the pies will be made and cheap cakes have been advanced a few cents, and the size of bread loaves will be somewhat reduced. All this due, so the master bakers say, to the advance in the cost of raw materials and labor.

THE ISLE OF PINES. American Residents Call on President and Present Grievances.

Washington, Nov. 10.—The question of the control of the Isle of Pines was brought today directly to the attention of President Roosevelt. A delegation of citizens of the United States residing on the Isle of Pines was introduced to the president by Senator Culham, chairman of the senate committee on foreign relations. The president was informed that more than half of the island is owned by American citizens and that many had made large investments on the island under the belief that the United States would govern it.

As a result of the turning over of the Isle of Pines to the republic of Cuba for administrative purposes, things are said by the delegation to be in a chaotic condition on the island. There is not a notary public or a judicial officer on the island. The delegation is informed that the republic of Cuba claims the Isle of Pines and proposes to establish prisons, penal colonies and a leper hospital there. Such a course, if pursued, the delegation indicated to the president, would wipe out every dollar invested on the island.

President Roosevelt promised to consider the subject, but indicated the line of procedure he was likely to take.

Hurt in a Wagon Upset. Carlin, Nev., Nov. 10.—William Johnson, a young man recently from Chicago, who now resides here, narrowly escaped serious injury this morning while out driving. Mr. Johnson is employed by one of the contracting firms of the Southern Pacific company, which has charge of the track work at Tonka. He secured a rig and with a young lady started for the camp. All went well until just as they were nearing Tonka, when the horse became frightened and in his efforts to get away managed to overturn the buggy, throwing both occupants to the ground. The young lady, though badly shaken, escaped without injury, but Johnson in trying to save her, became entangled in the wreck and was badly bruised about the face and head. He also received a sprained ankle and one arm was badly wrenched, but not broken. The party was brought back to Carlin, where Johnson's injuries were attended to. He will probably be laid up for awhile.

Big Sale of Idaho Timber. Boise, Ida., Nov. 10.—At Idaho City today Chief Clerk Stuenkelberg of the state land board today sold 24,885,000 feet of yellow pine at 81 cents per thousand. The purchaser is William Deary of Moscow, representing the North Land Pine company, in which Wisconsin lumbermen are interested. Under the terms of the sale 10 per cent of the total purchase price of \$12,141,008 was paid down. The remainder is to be paid as soon as the deeds shall have been executed. In that the purchaser should not accept the deeds and make the deferred payment, the money paid today will be forfeited to the state.

The timber sold is on lands selected by the state along the North Fork and its tributaries between Smith's Ford and the upper end of the lake. These lands cover 32,359 acres. Cobban and Casey made a bid of 90 cents per thousand for the timber.

Heineke's Motion Overruled. Helena, Mont., Nov. 10.—Judge Knowles today overruled the motion of F. Augustus Heineke, cross-complainant in the action of the Butte and Bozeman Mining company against John F. Forbis, executor, for an order compelling J. S. Harris, receiver of the Butte and Bozeman Mining company, to deposit the funds of the trust, amounting to \$225,000, in a bank or banks that pay interest on deposit.

Heineke claimed that the money should be deposited in the First National bank of Dillon, which offered to pay 2 1/2 per cent on a sum not to exceed \$20,000.

Receiver Harris, who was the only witness, told the court that he had made an effort to deposit the money where it would bring an income to the trust, but that the bank would not find no banks willing to take it. McGeary Put on Trial. He is Charged with the Murder of William J. Evans.

Anacosta, Mont., Nov. 10.—James McGeary, the slayer of William J. Evans, was placed on trial for his life today. The day was consumed in attempting to secure a jury, but the 15 men who answered to their names last night but a few minutes because of the trial, which in the case of McGeary, the court called for a special venire of 200, all of whom were subpoenaed Wednesday.

McGeary shot and killed Mr. Evans some months ago and after being taken to jail he declared as his reason for committing the crime that Mr. Evans had refused to adopt an invention which he (McGeary) had designed.

Mr. Evans was the general superintendent of machinery of the Amalgamated interests and was at the Washoe smelting plant looking after affairs there when he was killed. He was a popular and highly respected official and man. Aside from these facts he ranked as a Montana millionaire, hence the trial, which will likely consume two weeks, will be an interesting one.

A Motorman Kills a Captain. Norfolk, Va., Nov. 10.—J. A. Cahoon, a motorman on the Norfolk & Atlantic Terminal company, fatally shot Capt. Winfield Tucker of the Merritt & Chapman wrecking company. Tucker was drawing a pistol to shoot Cahoon, on account of domestic troubles, when Cahoon fired from the platform of his car. Cahoon was arrested.

For Thanksgiving in Idaho. Boise, Ida., Nov. 10.—Gov. Hunt issued the customary Thanksgiving proclamation. He recommended that business be suspended on the 27th day of November and the people unite in giving thanks for continued prosperity and all other blessings.

E. S. Dreyer Stays in Prison. Washington, Nov. 10.—The United States supreme court today affirmed the decision of the supreme court of the state of Illinois in the case of Edward S. Dreyer, formerly a member of the West Chicago Park commission, charged with having failed to turn over to his successor \$25,000 of public funds. Dreyer was found guilty under the charge and sentenced to a term in state's prison.

NEW EAST RIVER BRIDGE BURNED.

Damaged to the Extent of Half a Million Dollars.

TWO YEARS' WORK LOST.

Several Steamers Had Narrow Escapes—Fire Started in a Tool Shed—Was a Very Spectacular Scene.

New York, Nov. 10.—The new East River bridge, in process of construction between New York and Brooklyn, was damaged to the amount of at least \$500,000 tonight by a fire that for four hours raged 355 feet in the air, on the summit of the great steel tower on the New York side. There was probably no loss of life. Owing to the enormous height of the tower it was impossible to reach the fire with any apparatus in the fire department, and the flames, after devouring all the woodwork on the top of the tower, seized on the timber false work of the two foot bridges suspended from the main cables, burning away the supports. Nearly 1,000,000 feet of blazing lumber fell with a crash and a hiss into the stream. The falling foot bridge carried away a score of lighter cables and guys which hung from the water, rendering it necessary for the purpose of safety to stop all traffic up and down the river. The steamer Puritan and other craft had narrow escapes while running the gauntlet of the fiery brands that fell in showers from the burning bridge. The fire was the most spectacular conflagration that has ever been seen in New York.

The fire started in a tool shed, and from this it spread to the framework. Within five minutes after the discovery of the fire the whole top of the tower was in flames. Then the bridges fell, carrying with them many tons of bolts, rivets, nuts and tools. At that moment the Brooklyn fire boat was just below the bridge, and a heavy beam fell on her, breaking her rudder and sending her drifting down the stream. Sound steamers and all other up-river navigation was stopped.

While the fire was at its height a party of firemen were cut off at the base of the tower, where they were exposed to a torrent of brands and red-hot iron and steel. They were rescued several minutes later, having been burned. Brands from the tower set fire to the big storeroom of the Pennsylvania Steel company. It was entirely consumed and the contents were hurled into the river, together with two hoisting derricks on the platform.

It was 11 o'clock before the flames had devoured everything combustible, leaving only the steel tower and the four great 18-inch steel cables stretching across the river. These cables were recently completed, save for the steel sheathing, and it is feared that they have been badly damaged by the intense heat. Should it be necessary to replace them, the labor of two years would be lost.

Chief Engineer Martin, in charge of the bridge construction, said today that four steel saddles, weighing 21 tons, on the top of the tower, were red-hot, but were not damaged. Of the four cables resting upon the saddles two, he thought, would have to be partially replaced by splicing. This will involve a delay of at least four months. The remaining cables suffered little injury. The two foot bridges are estimated at \$100,000.

The contractors are John A. Roebling's Sons & Co. The bridge extends from the foot of Delancy street, Manhattan, to the foot of South Fifth street, Brooklyn. It was designed to carry four surface railroad tracks, two tracks for elevated trains, two roadways for vehicles, two foot paths and a bicycle path. The cost of the bridge was placed at about \$10,000,000.

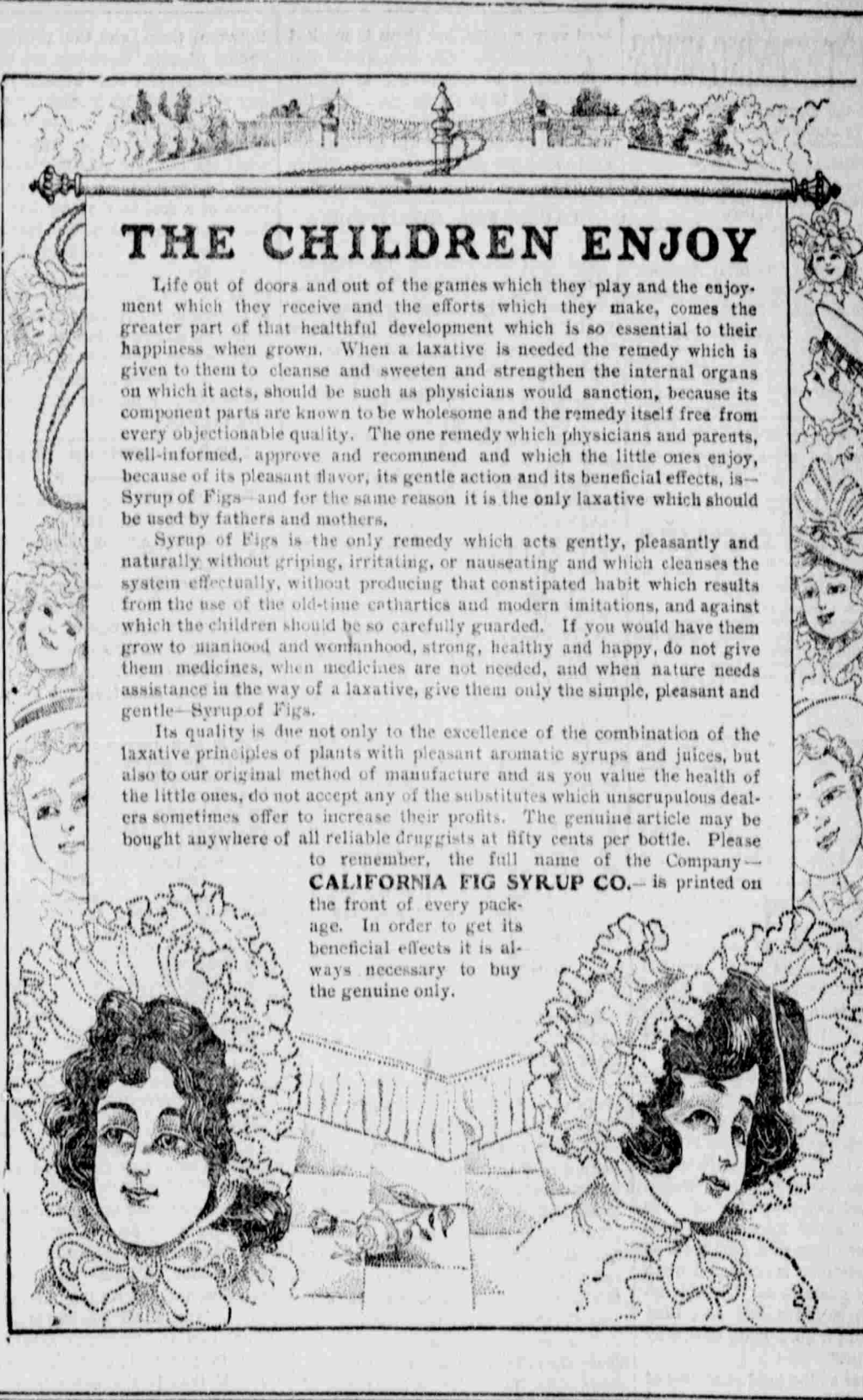
SALT TRUST KILLED. Judge Morrow Makes Temporary Injunction Permanent.

San Francisco, Nov. 10.—After United States Atty. Woodworth concluded argument today in the United States circuit court upon his petition to destroy the Federal Salt company and its associates as a trust, United States Circuit Judge Morrow ordered that the temporary injunction be made permanent as to all the defendants except the Imperial Salt company, which was not a party to the suit.

Very broadly that, should his decision be appealed from, the United States circuit court of appeals, following its ruling in the red cedar shingle trust, the title, mantle and estate trust and the coal trust, would sustain the injunction. The decision kills the salt trust.

An order was made citing the official of the Inland Crystal Salt company of Salt Lake to show cause why the injunction should not be made perpetual against that firm also.
