XLVIII CONGRESS.

WASHINGTON, 2.—After the transac-

tion of routine business, the Senate
looked up the Pacific railroad bill.

On motion of Hoar, certain amend-

ments reported by him from the judi-

ciary committee were made to the bill
and the matter went over till Wednes-

day.

Consideration of the interstate com-

merce bill was resumed.

Cullum said he hoped the bill would
be completed to-day. If not, he would
ask the Senate to remain in session un-

til it was disposed of, and would in-

terpret a declaration of the Senate to
remain in session to-morrow as evi-

dence of its intention to do so, and
that it was not a matter of time, but
of the subject.

The Senate declined to decline to
strike from the House bill the provision
relating to equal facilities and accom-

modations for passengers. The bill
was then referred to the committee on
railroads for a shorter time, but a longer
time than a shorter.

Beck moved an amendment to this,
so to prohibit the interstate com-

merce bill from being amended, and
that the whole length of the line be
tried to remedy one evil that was
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time than a shorter.

It would make the bill utterly useless
if it passed.

Beck's amendment, as modified, was
then voted down—yeas 41.

Beck then moved to amend the
House bill so to permit reduction of
rates without previous posting of no-

ington, D. C.

Denison, Texas, 2.—A terrible ex-

plosion of gas occurred yesterday in a
coal mine near Savanna, Indian Ter-

ritory. Three are reported killed and
eight or nine seriously burned.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., 2.—Fire was dis-

covered this evening in the steps of
the Eberle Coal Company, Eberle.

It is reported that some secret
agents here that Socialists have stored
arms and dynamite in this city, and
are ready for an outbreak and attack
on capitalists. Men from Hocking Valley
and elsewhere are said to be here
ready for business. Sensational develop-

ments are expected.

Nominations. Registrars of Land
Office. Humphrey, Secretary, Salt

The Secretary of the Interior has
recommended to Congress that about
seven million acres of land, included
in the Blackfoot, Fort Peck and Fort
Bellevue Indian agencies, Montana, be
restored to the public domain and
opened to settlement, and that the In-

dians be paid \$25,000 annually at each
agency for fifteen years.

The memorial stone contributed by
the State of West Virginia to the
Washington Monument arrived to-day.
California and Oregon are the only
States from which contributions of
this kind have not been received.
