LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

THEATRE.—Last evening Mrs. Bates appeared again as "Elizabeth" and Mr. Bates as "Robert, Earl of Essex," in the stirring drama of "Elizabeth, Queen of England," which was enacted with the known ability and success of these two artists and the local company. This evening the brilliant play of "The Secret of a Life," is announced, Mrs. Bates appearing as "Adrienne de Bauxpierre" and Mr. Bates as "W. C. Graham," in which both are very effective. INCUMBENTS OF FEDERAL OFFICES.—In the House of Representatives on Tuesday last, Mr. Whitley, member of Congress from Georgia, offered the following amendment to the civil service bill:

"That the Federal offices in the several States and Territories shall be filled by citizens thereof, and the appointments in the Departments shall be equitably apportioned between the States and Territories comprising this Union. And that all laws or parts of laws in conflict with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed."

There being no objection the proposed amendment was referred to the committee. The original bill on the civil service reform was recommitted, and there is a prospect that the bill when again presented, will contain the above clause.—*Cheyenne Leader, April 30.*

She replied that she did not want them; that all she desired was a good education, and she could have that she would be content with the plainest clothing, for her strongest wish was to qualify herself to be of service to her government and her countrywomen when she returned to Japan."

A DEFENSIBLE STORY.—There was the screaming spectacle of a drunken woman on First South Street. She swore and made a general disturbance in the vicinity of the Kimball block, until she was put into a job wagon and taken to the city hall. The name of the woman is Mrs. Gunn, a recent importation from Corinne.

THE NORTH BRIDGE.—Persons visiting the bench north of the Twentieth Ward, who have not been up that way for some time, are surprised at the rapidity with which it has been built up. So far as the location is concerned it is a very desirable place for residence, and some very good buildings have been erected there during the past two years. The situation commands a delightful view of nearly the whole of the city and a large extent of surrounding country, but the locality has had one serious drawback—the lack of water for irrigating purposes. Many of the residents have planted out gardens and orchards, but their efforts in this direction have been unavailing for they have had the disappointment of seeing their trees, etc., languish and die for want of water. We are informed, however, by Brother Mark Lindsey, that there will be a pretty good supply of water during the present season. Yet before the stream can be let down to the city lots it is necessary that considerable labor be expended in repairing the ditch. With this and in view, Brother Lindsey, the water master, as will be seen by an advertisement in another column, makes a call for those interested in the ditch to turn out with necessary tools and meet him at seven o'clock on Monday morning. There should be a general response to this call. If the people will respond and with a little labor get the water upon their lots they will greatly enhance the value of their property. As the ditch is several miles in length it will require a large force of men to repair it in a short time. Brother Lindsey would like not less than a hundred men and industry combined can make the bench one of the most desirable parts of the city.

CUT WORKSOME SNAKES are very destructive in gardens. The following remedy which we find in an exchange is very simple, and worth trying—

"It is very annoying, after having set out a nice lot of sweet potatoes or cabbage plants, to see them cut down one by one by cut worms. We have tried baits, lime, soap, and in fact everything we have ever heard of, but never found anything effectual until, by accident, we found three or four of the worms gone. One morning under a small board which had been left by some children on a sweet potato hill. Acting upon this hint, we placed some pieces of board, large chips, etc., all through the patch, and we trapped them by hundreds. The boards were left there for a few days, and the worms were all gone. A little care for a few days will clear these pests out of the garden. One trial will satisfy any person of the merits of this plan."

FLORISSANT GARDENS.—The Twentieth Ward pleasure gardens, north of the cemetery, were opened for the season yesterday, and the children of the Tenth Ward Sunday school spent the day there, enjoying an agreeable time.

ANOTHER LUNACY.—To-day Judge Strickland ruled briefly on the liquor case of Salt Lake City versus Loomis, in favor of Loomis, particularly and generally of all those persons who refuse to pay license to the city authorities, his honor deciding that the Mayor and Aldermen of the city had no judicial powers.

"HABEAS CORPUS."—C. W. Baker, under commitment for perjury, was taken before Judge Strickland to-day on a writ of habeas corpus, and was continued this morning and afternoon.

LOCAL SELF-GOVERNMENT.—The unanimous decision of the Supreme Court of the United States in the matter of the recent criminal proceedings in Utah, serves to illustrate one step in the progress which the Washington government has made in the direction of centralization and imperialism. The specific point decided by the court was that the jury drawn by the federal marshal under the act of Congress, and not by the Territorial marshal under the local law, was illegal and its finding therefore void. The court, however, took occasion to go further, in order to establish and explain the fundamental principle of self-government, which is the very cornerstone of our whole governmental system; that is, the inherent right of local self-government.

Of course, the radical imperialists will cry out against a decision which so plainly exposes to popular reprobatation their centralizing schemes and purposes. The end, they will say, was a commendable one; the suppression of polygamy, the condign punishment of much married Mormons, was an end that justified the means, even though the means was a step in the transmission of the inhabitants of these States from the relation of self-governing citizens to that of subjects of an imperial sovereign at Washington.—*Colorado People.*
