WEBER COUNTY ASSESSMENT ROLL

Shows Gratifying Increase in Valuations, Precluding Necessity of Raising Tax Levy.

SESSION OF CITY COUNCIL.

Water Ordinance Passed—\$1,000 to G. A. R. Encampment—Wedding Permits—Deaf and Blind Reunion.

OGDEN, June 10.—The new assessment roll for Weber county has been completed by County Assessor Edwin Dix and has been turned over to County Treasurer Chambers to issue the notices of valuation. The total valuation for the county is \$17,150,000 and of this amount, the state board of equalization has returned \$2,750,000.

Mr. Dix, in speaking of the valuation, stated that during the past three years the valuation had increased about \$2,000,000 which should be sufficient to avoid any increase in tax levies. The real increase in the city should include the waterworks system, assessed at \$175,000 in 1908, now owned by the city and exempted. This would make

DEAF PUPILS REUNION.

OGDEN, June 10.—At 2:30 p. m. today, graduates and former pupils of the Utah school for the deaf and blind will hold a reunion at the institution.

Supt. E. M. Briggs expects about 50 blind persons from all parts of the state to be present.
A program has been arranged for the entertainment of the visitors, who will be in Ogden until Saturday. A reception and ball will be given in the gymnasium of the school this evening. A trip through Ogden canyon will be one of the enjoyable features of Friday's program. Saturday the entire party will go to Saltair to spend the day.

CITY COUNCIL SESSION.

OGDEN, June 10.—At the adjourned meeting of the city council last night, a resolution was unanimously adopted, appropriating \$1,000 for the entertainment of the veterans who will attend the next national encampment of the G. A. R. in Salt Lake City next August.

The first partial estimate for \$4,760, due the Wheelright Construction company for work done on the new reservoir, was allowed upon the recommendation of City Engineer Parker.

Councilman Austin called the attention of the council to the bad condition of Wall avenue from Twenty-fifth to Thirtieth streets as a result of an excavation made by the Ogden Rapid Transit company for the extension of its car lines. The matter was referred to the street committee, the city engineer and city attorney.

An ordinance providing for the operation of the waterworks system of Ogden city, prescribing the rules and regulations governing the use and distribution of the water and the method of making connections and fixing the rate to be charged for water passed its third and final readings. The ordinance is practically the same as when the system was owned by a private corporation, the only changes being a provision allowing drug stores, photograph galleries, soda fountains and the public schools of the city the option of paying for water by meter rate.

OGDEN, June 10.—In a statement made at the union depot yesterday afternoon by General Superintendent Davis of the Oregon Short Line, who was in the city for a short time while en route to Idaho, stated that within a very short time work would begin upon the many improvements that have been outlined by the road for Ogden. He stated that on account of the heavy passenger traffic, there being 60 trains a day in and out of Ogden at the Union depot, that five additional tracks would be built at the union depot.

ADDITION TO PROVO GENERAL HOSPITAL

New Building to be Erected With Other Improvements to Cost \$30,000.

(Special Correspondence.)

PROVO, June 10.—The business of the Provo General hospital has been increasing so rapidly that the proprietors find it necessary to secure additional room. They are accordingly preparing to erect a three-story building, with basement, at an approximate cost of \$30,000, just north of the present building. L. L. Nunn is interested in the undertaking and has generously volunteered to install a ventilating plant at a cost of \$1,500, in connection with which will be electrical apparatus for developing ozone from the atmosphere.

BELL TELEPHONE BUSINESS.

PROVO, June 10.—The franchise granted the Bell Telephone company in this city, recently, is entirely unsatisfactory to the company. The city council in granting the franchise thought it would be fair to give the Bell people the same terms that were given to the Independent Telephone company about four years ago, and therein the company and the council clash. The especially objectionable section is the maximum rate clause, which the company would like stricken out or very materially amended.

When the matter was before the council, a committee from the Commercial club appeared before that body and urged very strongly that the Bell company should be given a more liberal franchise than that of the Independent company. To this action the Bell company took exception, and asked for an investigation of the company's business by a committee to be appointed by the club.

Last night the committee submitted its report, which included the following statistics for 1908, attested to the committee by the officials of the company:

The report of the committee has the following concluding paragraph: "After careful investigation of these figures, your committee arrived at the conclusion that they represent a true statement of the business of said company for the year 1908, and they are respectfully submitted for the information of the club."

The officials of the company declare the company can not operate under the franchise. The next move will be awaited with interest.

Her little cousin, Myron Hales, aged 5 years, found an old shotgun lying about the house and was so rusty that grown people could hardly work it at all, and the stock was also broken off. He got some shells out of the house and loaded both barrels. Somehow the gun was discharged and little Miss Craft received the full load in the right arm. Three inches of the arm between the elbow and shoulder was completely shattered and hung by a little skin. Drs. Thayer of Mercur and Noyes of American Fork were summoned and amputated the arm just below the shoulder.
