DEAR BIR,-Allow us, through the columns of your excellent and widely circulated journal, to express our heartfelt gratitude to the City Council of Ogden City, for the kind expression of their appreciation of our services and couduct during our career in the public service in surrection, and authorized a large number of whites to act as a posse comitatus to arrest and disperse the armed bands of negroes. Whites numbering seventy-five, under the command of Col. Ball, met negroes numbering two hundred to find a host of fitente

command of Col. Ball, met negroes numbering two hundred, com-manded by Neah Parker, near Hunt's Place, and a battle en-sued, in which the colored commander and one tof his cap-tains, Arthur McBrooks, toge-ther with five other leaders, were killed, and a large number wound-ed. The negroes scattered in wild confusion after the first fire, and none of the whites were seriously hurt.
