

BAD POLICY.

Upon inquiring of one of our city tanners and manufacturers the other day respecting business he informed us that he had nothing to complain of but the scarcity of hides. If he could obtain them, business would be tolerably good.

Is there not something radically wrong about this policy? If every hide produced in this Territory were tanned here, there would still be a necessity for importing leather to supply our wants.

The cost of manufacturing here is doubtless greater than it is in the East; but if the tanneries are already built, and we have the bark and other materials necessary for tanning, and then have the hides of our own production to tan, we should be able to nearly, if not quite, compete with Chicago or San Francisco in the production of leather.

SALT LAKE CITY, June 25, 1870.

Editor Deseret News.—SIR.—My last letter, written at St. Charles, Rich Co., on the 16th instant, contained a synopsis of the journey of President Young and party on their northern trip, up to the date of writing. I shall now continue, giving a very brief sketch of their travels and labors until they reached this city, yesterday.

June 17.—President Young and company drove through Fish Haven, on the Lake shore, round the south end of the Lake to Itasca, twenty-five miles from Paris. A meeting was held at eleven o'clock a.m., the speakers on the occasion being President D. H. Wells, Elders C. C. Rich, John Taylor, L. Snow, F. D. Richards, W. Woodruff, and A. M. Musser and President Young.

Saturday 18th.—We attended the School of the Prophets in Paris, where valuable counsel and instruction were given by Presidents Young and Wells; Elders Taylor and Woodruff also being speakers on that occasion.

Sunday, 19th.—We held a meeting at the Bowers in Paris. President Wells addressed the people one hour, on a variety of subjects, and gave good counsel; He was followed by President Young, who spoke of the improvement of the people since the days of Joseph, and the necessity of the continuation of this improvement.

Monday, 20th.—We drove over the mountains to Franklin and held a meeting, the people being addressed by L. Snow, John Taylor, D. H. Wells, W. Woodruff, F. D. Richards and President Young.

Tuesday 21st.—We drove to Richmond and held meeting at ten o'clock in the morning. President Young addressed the Saints, and counseled them in very plain terms. He said that if the Lord blessed them with a crop this season they should preserve that grain, lay it up and not squander it away.

Wednesday 22nd, a two days' meeting commenced. President Young made the opening address, and remarked "If I were to ask how many there are in this congregation who were in Jackson county, or how many of you were in Kirtland, I think there would be but few."

Amendments to the army appropriation bill were reported; also a bill for the relief of the National Homestead at Gettysburg for orphans of the soldiers and sailors of the United States.

Summer reported a joint resolution, directing the return of certain monies of the government of China, being the balance of the Chinese indemnity fund; ordered printed.

A bill was passed, authorizing the forty thousand appropriation of 1866 for the Darien Canal survey, to be expended by the present expedition. Ramsey introduced a bill to establish a transatlantic postal telegraph service by the American cables; referred.

Cuban independence. Cassery said he was not prepared to tell Spain that he understood the merits of the slavery question in Cuba better than she did.

The Georgia Bill passed.—Another charge against Butler. The Georgia bill was discussed till three o'clock p.m., then amended and finally passed, as follows: Section first, that the State of Georgia, having complied with the reconstruction acts, and the fourteenth and fifteenth amendments to the Constitution having been ratified in good faith by the legal legislature of said State, it is hereby declared that the State is entitled to representation in Congress, and nothing in this act shall be construed to deprive the people of Georgia of their rights to an election for members in the general assembly, as provided for in the Constitution of said State.

WASHINGTON. Hear Will Close Up all Unfinished Business.—Nominations. WASHINGTON, 24.—The Secretary of the Treasury has directed the payment of the July interest on and after the 28th of June.

The President has signed the act to pay loyal citizens in the rebel States for services in taking the last census. The commission of Attorney-General Akerman will not be issued for several days, and his friends believe that he will not qualify for at least a month, and that Hear will remain, meanwhile, to clear up all unfinished business.
