SPONGING BARRED IN ROBERT PARK

Mayor to Issue Order Banishing Too Demonstrative Cupid From Public Playground.

COUPLES MUST NOW BEHAVE

Campaign Against Hugging and Kissing in Public to Be Inaugurated by Authorities.

Persons who have made liberty park a "sponging" ground must go elsewhere for such diversion. Such an edict will be issued by Mayor Bransford, and Parkkeeper Henry Heath will see to it that the order is strictly enforced.

The attention of the executive has been called to the fact that every day couples so deport themselves in the park as to excite hilarity among children and indignation on the part of older persons who are wont to congregate there. The nuisance has been extended by officials of the grounds, with the hope that offenders would come to a realization of the effects of their misconduct.

However, evidence among the park is becoming more and more common, and drastic measures are to be employed to rid the park of such nuisance.

The practice complained of can scarcely be said to be general. A few couples furnish most of the cause for the faultfinding on the part of the public. Some of these seem to have no sense of propriety and good manners. They say nothing of the rules of decency. They have no respect for persons who for proper and legitimate purposes have sought the quietude and shade of the park, and certainly show an entire lack of regard for their own reputations.

Of the brazen effrontery alluded to, the chief offenders of late have been a street car employee and a woman who appears to be several years his junior. Nearly every afternoon in the week they repair to the park during the latter part of the afternoon and remain from one to three hours, "hilling and cooing." Scandalous is not sought for, as the pair evidently care little or nothing what picknickers or pedestrians may think of their actions. The man is devoid of shame, though the woman would doubtless conduct herself properly but for the persistency of her escort. This couple will doubtless be the first to come under the man of exclusion from the park, unless there is some sort of reform on their part in the manner of conducting themselves in public places.

Citizens have expressed themselves to the effect that if they cannot take their children to the park for an afternoon's outing without being subjected to the indignity of witnessing hugging and kissing scenes, they will not go. The subject will probably be presented at the meeting of the city council next Monday evening.
