Among other events related in the life of Father Grover were that he was one of the Prophet Joseph Smith's body guard, was one who helped to prepare and lay away the bodies of the mar-tyred Prophet and Patriarch. He was one of the first High Councilors of the Church. He built the ferry boats and ferried the Pioneer company across the Platte river. In this work he proved himself so capable that the Prophet Brigham Young requested him to remain and ferry the succeeding con panies of Saints across, which he did thereby delaying his own entrance in to the valley until October, 1847. As an example of his generosity on several occasions he killed a beef and

GETTING RID OF GRASSHOPPERS.

Last summer the grasshoppers were I this time were about half grown and had not reached the flying stage yet very numerous in our section and it Being very busy I did not go to exam-ine the field until the third day, when I became necessary to do something to check them. Some of my neighbors was surprised and delighted to find nearly an entire absence of grasshop. adopted the coal oil hopper-doser and pers and what was puzzling me, bu destroyed large numbers of them, but few dead ones were found. the expense was so great that I did not left the field and never came back, hav. think it paid. The question came up ing evidently died somewhere else. what other method could be adopted I have found this characteristic o paris green, that it first makes the vic tim sick, with a tendency to movement that would destroy the pests. As is well known, insects are easily poisoned it is so with mice, potato bugs and also noticed it with the army worm and as grasshoppers are insects I con-

which I dosed with the poison last spring when they invaded my potato cluded to try it. I procured paris green and a spray pump, fixed up a coal oil barrel by fastening the pump in it and made a cover to avoid splashing the patch, checking them immediately Now in regard to the effect of the polmixture out and filled the barrel with son on the alfalfa. It would probably be dangerous to pasture the alfalfa while the poison was on, but the first rain will wash it off. In cured hay I estimate that an animal would have to I used one pound of paris green to fifty gallons of water. This is rather strong but I calculated that the poison

was perhaps adulterated, so used more than was necessary if it had been pure.
