JUDICIAL COURT.—Here is the substance of a dispatch from Beaver, received today:

BEAVER, May 23.—The court of C. M. Hawley, the associate justice of the Supreme court of the United States, in the month of June, met, as per adjournment, but inasmuch as Judge Duncan, his deputy U. S. marshal, had gone to St. George, on the 21st inst., to collect of H. E. Dodge five dollars, part of the expense of a withdrawn suit, and had not returned, his honor adjourned the court on Monday and Tuesday, having no court officer. However, a Jew named J. Baumgartner, who is here looking after a government beef contract, and who was formerly a deputy U. S. marshal, came to the rescue by offering his services, so the court was in session yesterday, and a few citizens were naturalized.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—"Nestor" writes from Tooele, May 23:

"Last Saturday, May 23d, a fatal accident occurred, resulting in the death of Thomas T. Tanner, thirteen years of age, and son of Thomas and Susan Tanner, of this place. The accident happened about as follows: A number of boys were amusing themselves at a game of ball, and one of the boys, while drawing his ball to strike the ball, accidentally struck the deceased a blow a little under the left ear, causing his death in a few minutes. A coroner's inquest was held the same evening, at which Dr. Tait, of Salt Lake City, was present."

"Since last Thursday there have been six deaths in this place, three, I believe, died of a malignant type of scarlet fever, one by accident, as narrated above, and two of a disease called in medical parlance *corona spino meningitis*.

"These circumstances have cast a gloom over the people."

NEW FIRE COMPANY.—We were requested to publish the following yesterday, but it was unavoidably left over till today:

The Confidence Fire Company, organized on Tuesday night. About fifty members were enrolled, and the following officers were elected: President, James D. Meagher; vice-president, Allen L. Cowan; secretary, M. Levi; treasurer, J. A. Trumbull; foreman, R. O'Keefe; and assistant, T. B. Campbell; second assistant, Dan Rice.

The following resolutions were unanimously adopted: That a committee of five be appointed by the board, to confer with the honorable the Mayor and the Council of this city, and request the recognition of this company as one of the fire companies of Salt Lake City, and to aid this company to procure the necessary apparatus for a fire company.

Resolved—That this company has no other motive in view but to aid the com-

pany already established in the city, in the suppression of fire, protection of property, and for the mutual aid and relief of their members in case of sickness or distress.

There will be another meeting connected with this movement on Saturday at 8 o'clock, at Richards' Hall.

FROM "DIXIE."—Brother Henry W. Miller, from St. George, called at our Office today. We were informed by him that the road from St. George to the quarry from which the rock for the temple at that place will be taken, is now completed. The weather has been cool and dry for a considerable time, but the extensive snow deposits in the mountains will supply water in sufficient quantity to meet the wants of the farmers for irrigation. No grasshoppers and excellent prospects for grain and fruit crops. The only grasshoppers that Brother Miller used with him on his way to the City were in Juab County, between Nephi and Chicken Creek. The grasshopper stock herd is prospering beyond expectation. The association recently declared a dividend of forty cents, notwithstanding that about \$5,000 had been spent by the stockholders during that period in making improvements on the ranch.

NEW MEAT MARKET.—A new meat market has been established in the Twentieth Ward market district by the authorities of the city. The market building recently erected, is situated on South Temple Street, at the corner of the Twelfth Ward, and immediately opposite the residence of Bishop John Sharp. This action on the part of the city fathers is looked upon by a large proportion of the residents of the city as not only judicious but exceedingly necessary, conferring, as it does, a great benefit upon people living in the extreme eastern and north and south-eastern parts of town, who have heretofore probably been almost compelled at times to do without meat for their table on account of the long distance to be traveled before it could be purchased. Many complaints have been uttered in the past, arising from this cause, and which the establishment of this market will abolish.

Mr. Charles Sansome has been appointed market master, and Mr. Henry Perkins, of the Eleventh Ward, and who had an extended experience in the butchering line in Liverpool before coming to this country, has rented one of the stalls, which he purposes opening on Saturday. The other stalls, we understand, are still vacant.
