They believe firmly that it is the only style of hairdressing that becomes them, and they will adhere to it just as long as possible. But with the radical changes in gowns and coats, hat shapes have so altered that few of them accord with a built-up coiffure. If an absolutely flat effect above the brow is impossible, owing to the facial contour, the better way is to arrange the front locks over a small roll, drawing them loosely to the back of the head. The hair may then be coiled, or pinned on, at whatever point below the crown is best adapted to the shape of the head. Ribbons threaded in and out among the tresses are worn with every type of costume. In the house during the day the fashionable pastel tones are favored, gold and silver bands are used with evening toilettes, and with street suits whatever shade of ribbon matches the hat trimmings.


