

KENNEDY GETS SIDEWALK JOB

Contract For Fifty Miles of Cement Walks Let By The Board.

LARGEST AWARDED TO DATE.

Territory Included in Ninth South to City Limits, Main to Thirteenth East Street Boundaries.

Fifty miles of sidewalk contract was let by the board of public works to James Kennedy last night, his bid being \$203,017.14, the lowest of four bids received. The other bidders were S. Birch & Sons' Construction company, who offered to do the work for \$214,423.78; Davis & Heuser, whose tender was \$249,535.49, and J. W. Mellen, who wanted \$205,322.36 for the job. The city's portion of the improvement is figured at \$42,555.50.

This is the largest single improvement contract ever awarded by the city. The contract calls for the construction of a strip less than 50 miles of sidewalks in the southeastern part of the city, the boundaries of the territory to be thus improved being as follows: From Ninth South street to Thirteenth East street. The contract specifies that the work must be completed by Oct. 31, 1909. The work will commence at Ninth South and Thirteenth East street, and about 15 miles of walks will be completed before the end of the present year. A certified check for \$10,000 accompanied the bid, and a bond of \$10,000 will be required for the faithful performance of the conditions of the contract. The bond must be filed within five days.

ELIMINATED DISTRICT.

City Engineer Kelsey recommended the elimination of about two and three-quarters miles of sidewalk from the original specifications, and this section was not included in the bid. The portion eliminated is as follows:

Thirteenth East from Ninth South to Downingtown, 6,081 feet; Harvard, north side, from Ninth East to canal, 1,023; Harvard, both sides, north northeast corner, 1,069; from Ninth East to canal, one block; Three, Park View subdivision of block 17A-5 acre plat A to Thirteenth East, 1,343.89; Thirteenth South, north side, from State to Third East, 2,376; Calhoun, both sides, from Harvard southward, 926; Verona, both sides, from Clydesdale to city limits, 524.70; Greeley, both sides, north from city limits, 508.29; Downingtown, north side, east from Eleventh East, 502; total, 14,258.45 feet. The board passed the following estimates: Davis & Heuser, fourth partial estimate, sewer extension 136, \$11,671.70; P. J. Moran, fourth partial estimate, paving extension 34, \$18,555.50. The board then adjourned until Friday, Oct. 2.
