

SALT LAKERS IN GOTHAM.

NEW YORK, Oct. 8.—The L. D. S. conference held at Nauvoo Oct. 1 was largely attended by elders from several of the different missions. Presidents McQuarrie and Jacobs of the Brooklyn conference were present. Mr. O. C. Bean made the report from Pittsburgh to be one of the favored in that assemblage; he also sought and obtained an interview with Judge Hamilton, one of the "Carthage Grays," who was prominent with the mob that killed the Prophet Joseph and his brother Hyrum, and who helped lay out the bodies of the two martyrs. From Judge Hamilton's point of view, he declares the "Carthage Grays" could have prevented the assassination had their commander so desired it, and also stopped the depredations, which did not cease after the expulsion of the Mormons. These and many other interesting facts were brought out by the aged Judge, which were of vital interest to those hearing the oft-told tale, but which never fails to hold the listener. The conference from all points of view was intensely interesting to all who took part in it, and adds another foothold to the many being gained by the people who once owned and beautified that land of promise.

Very disquieting rumors come from the sick room of William H. Dale, who is in a private hospital on West 85th street. Mrs. Dale is expected today, as the condition of her husband, was critical. The doctors have been very hopeful until the last three days, when a change for the worse developed and little hope has been held out for his recovery. R. W. Sloan has been his constant attendant since his arrival here, sharing the vigils with nurses and physicians; he maintains a strong hope for his friend's recovery.



He is not only less obstreperous and egotistical, but clearer and cleaner minded than the lad of twenty years ago. His advance physically will be manifest to any one who will compare the figures in a class photograph of today with those of yesterday. He is taller, straighter, better featured, finer-haired, handsomer and more like a thoroughbred in every way. The exercise to which much of this improvement is attributable may be no more zealous, but it seems to be less spasmodic, more consistent and better adapted to its true purpose. As an inevitable sequence, his habits have become more regular, improving in turn his manners.
