LOGAN STREET RAILWAY SYSTEM TO BE RUSHED

Plan to Have Road in Operation Before Severe Weather Sets In.

LOGAN, Oct. 16.—Joseph Bailey, superintendent of the Ogden Rapid Transit company, was in the city last evening in the interest of the Logan Rapid Transit company. A meeting was held in the Commercial Booster club with President E. P. Bacon, Mayor Edwards and a number of other citizens. The matter of attaching the pole fixtures of the street car company to the poles of the City Power company and the Bell Telephone company was discussed. The object is to save the stringing of another row of poles on the streets of the city. It is thought this matter can be adjusted.

Mr. Bailey said that now the road to Plain City had been completed all enclaves will be directed to the Logan road. The pole fixtures are all at the depot and the car will arrive soon. On Monday a force of six or eight grade teams will be put to work and it is the plan to have the road in operation before severe weather sets in.
